## COOPERATIVE PROGRAM IS MISSIONS

In this issue of the Milepost, you will find a couple of articles by some of your IMB missionaries serving in different parts of the world. As you read these articles you will see a huge contrast in receptivity to the gospel. In Central Asia, missionaries are working among Muslim peoples in places that are antagonistic to Christianity. The work is slow and response minimal. However, gospel conversations lay the groundwork for locals to come to a point of recognizing the emptiness of their religion. It is amazing to see the change in one's countenance when they embrace the truth of God's relentless love for all people.

Many South American countries like Venezuela have seen major movements of gospel response that lead to baptisms and affiliation with local churches. If you want to hear more stories from missionaries to Venezuela, I'm sure that Butch and Pam Strickland would be eager to recount fascinating occurrences of lives transformed and committed to serving the One who saved them from their sin. The gospel has the power to reach people in hard soil as well as soft soil.

***So, what is the key to reaching people?*** It's a commitment to live out the Great Commission in our everyday lives, even if we can't travel to a distant country to share the gospel. Our IMB missionaries sacrificially offer themselves to leave home and fam-

ily and plant their lives in a culture with the hope of impacting that culture with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

***How can they do that?*** That's where the Cooperative Program (CP) comes in. The call to the Great Commission is for all the redeemed in Christ, not only those with a specific calling to go to unreached peoples and encounter them face-to-face. To become an incarnational witness requires support financially, prayerfully, intentionally from all of us by giving sacrificially so missionaries can focus on the main task of evangelism and church planting.

***How can I do that?*** Jesus' prayer to the Father in John 17:20-21 unveils his heart for how this can be accomplished. Oneness – Unity! Unity in the Body of Christ requires cooperation with one another. The Cooperative Program was implemented in 1925 as a funding mechanism for supporting the work of missions. It takes all of us working together, cooperating together, giving so that the gospel has every opportunity to penetrate lostness in our world.

Cooperative Program is **MISSIONS!** It's not a financial plan! It's not a fund-raising scheme! It is the heartbeat of missions founded on fulfilling the Great Commission. I challenge every Southern Baptist Church to give through the CP so that every lost person has a chance to hear the gospel message and respond to God's invitation to salvation.

## **An Encouraging Word**

The church, the bride of Christ, the family of God is a wonderful institution that should be the bedrock of our communities. Most would point to post-World War II as a great time for the body of Christ in our nation. People lived their daily lives around the calendar of the church. Most attended three times a week. The front door of the church was the Sunday school class. This community was the basic framework of the church where everybody knew your name, birthday and probably your favorite dish. Pot lucks, church sings, associational gatherings, mission studies, and discipleship classes kept people engaged. So much was different as the population was more rural than urban. The family impacted young lives and most families had both a mom and dad. Authority was respected, the policeman was honorable, and children knew if they got in trouble in school, more discipline waited at home. Most people not only knew the Ten Commandments, but lived by them. In churches, missionaries were highlighted and honored for giving their lives to go abroad to reach unchurched people groups.

Now, according to data from Thom Rainer, most members attend church only three times a month. With COVID, many pastors are discouraged by diminished attendance, and the inability to minister to the sick as hospitals have made it impossible to visit. To reach more church members, classes and worship need to be in-person and on-line. Outreach activities are scarce as people do not want activities to be super-spreader events. Our culture has changed and it has impacted our members and ministers.

There is encouragement. We are tough and resilient. We understand the transitory nature of our communities. We are not disheartened by the unchurched percentages of our community rather, we accept the vast lostness and minister here knowing that it is not the Bible Belt. Let's heed the writer of Hebrews 12,

### **Hebrews 12:1-2 (CSBBible)**

*<sup>1</sup> Therefore, since we also have such a large cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let us lay aside every hindrance and the sin that so easily ensnares us. Let us run with endurance the race that lies before us, <sup>2</sup> keeping our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. For the joy that lay before him, he endured the cross, despising the shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.*

We still have a race to run, keeping our eyes on Jesus. It is time to lead with exuberance and excellence, with courage and enthusiasm. Rally the remaining troops, raise the banner of truth and stand firm on God's Word. God has not changed, His Word is constant. The church will not fail. Our message is one of hope, change, freedom and security, not despair or fear. One thing I have learned since my accident, I can't dwell on the past, or stay in grief over anything lost. We must live for today. We must be passionate about what can come tomorrow and fight every thought that would hold us captive to fear and despair. God gives a bright future no matter what overwhelms us in the present. There are still so many people to be reached. There are still believers who want to continue what we have started and need us to continue as leaders.

I encourage you to come hear some great preaching, teaching, and music at the State Evangelism Conference. This event, February 3-4, will be a great source of encouragement in these trying times. # Special Donation From Berkland Baptist Church Network

In celebration of the 40th anniversary since its founding, the Berkland Baptist Church network of churches has made a special gift to the Alaska Baptist Resource Network in the amount of \$100,000. This donation will be used to fund church planting, church revitalization and collegiate ministry.

## An offering of gratitude

The decision was made when more than 400 members of the extended church family gathered in Plymouth, Mass., in November 2021 to celebrate the Network's anniversary. Donations were also made to The Baptist Convention of New England and the California Southern Baptist Convention. Shortly after gathering the special offering, it was voted upon and approved unanimously by all eleven congregations.

"As much as 2021 is a monumental landmark year for our church, we give God all the praise and glory," said

Drs. Paul and Rebekah Kim. "We hope and pray that our offering to the three conventions can encourage all local SBC workers to continue laboring tirelessly for the gospel. May many churches be planted and revitalized so that a great number of souls can be saved in fulfillment of the Great Commandment and the Great Commission."

## A passion for churches planting churches

Dr. Paul Kim and his wife, Dr. Rebekah Kim, founded Berkland Baptist Church in Berkeley, Calif., in 1981. Ten years later, they moved to Boston and planted Berkland Baptist Church – Boston, now Antioch Baptist Church in Cambridge, MA. The church continued to plant more

churches over the next three decades, including Philadelphia Mission Baptist Church; Worthy Life Baptist Church in Washington, D.C. and Baltimore; Koinonia Community Baptist Church in Long Beach, Calif., as well as churches in South Korea, the Republic of Georgia, Uzbekistan and the Republic of Armenia.

## Supporting ministry in Alaska

In October 2015, Pastor Paul and Rebekah visited Anchorage to participate in the annual gathering of Prayer-Link. They felt convicted of the increasing need for the gospel to be proclaimed in the frontier state of Alaska and, with their vision, Frontier Baptist Church was planted on June 19, 2016 in downtown Fairbanks. Frontier Baptist Church is led by Senior Pastor James Suh and his wife Soomi and Associate Pastor Philip Kim and his wife Esther. According to Pastor Suh, "Our church ministers to many different groups, from UAF college students to high school youth to fami-

lies with children to working professionals, all with a vision to love God and love one another."

Dr. Randy Covington, Executive Director of the ABRN expressed his appreciation: "We are so thankful for Drs. Paul and Rebekah Kim for 40 years of faithfulness in preaching, teaching, and reaching people with the transforming power of the gospel and their hearts for planting churches in the unreached corners of the globe. We are also thankful for the great work that Frontier Baptist is doing in the interior of Alaska. I have no doubt that many more will be saved as a result of their ministry, and that many more will be trained to go to the frontier places of our world because of this special gift."



# Providing medical care to Venezuela's neglected leads to professions of faith

National partner Zuleima de Rojas began an outreach after receiving medicine for a neglected community from Send Relief. This ministry has led to many in an assisted living facility coming to Christ.

Rojas, Send Relief's Critical Medicines Project coordinator, alongside Send Relief workers Alan and Gaudy Carlton, began reaching out to this community of individuals with special needs and elderly individuals after learning that none were receiving medicine, despite each patient having serious medical needs.

The team's visits have become a monthly occurrence so that the doctors can provide care to the patients in the facility and refill the

medicine they need. While caring for and loving on the people there, the gospel has been shared and many have come to Christ.

Recently they had an old timey "meet me at the river" baptism for nine of those who made professions of faith. For Alan, "These photos and commentary explain why we do what we do."

The team could not submerge one woman, Luz, because she has a prosthe-

sis in her leg that is open to bacteria in the water. She was also in much pain and could not tolerate the strong current in the water. However, the team baptized her by the river by pouring a bucket of water over her head.

After her baptism, Luz shared her testimony: "When I found the Baptist church, I had my problems to find the medicines for me. The church helped me to find my medicines, because in my country it is so hard to buy it. They are very expensive. The church helped me to find all, I repeat, all my medicines

for the treatment I need.

"Since the moment the church first

saw me, they haven't failed me. Everything has been very beautiful and very good.

"Since I believe in Jesus, I have been studying the Bible, and then today I was baptized.

"Everything was very pretty. In the beginning I was nervous, but thank God everything was great, and now I am feeling great."

Eight other believers, besides Luz, were also baptized.

"This year, our goal in working with the ministry of medicine is to reach out to more for baptism in June and make another effort and baptize again in December," Carlton added. "Together as God's team we can take more people to heaven!"

## **Fuhr Scholarship:**

- for undergraduate students
- must have been Alaska resident for two years.
- must have good membership standing with a recognized congregation of the Alaska Baptist Resource Network (see brochure for specifics)
- maximum amount of scholarship \$1900 (see brochure for specifics)
- must have a complete scholarship packet submitted by April 30, 2022 (see brochure for specifics)
- maximum of 10 scholarships awarded for 2022

## **Parker Scholarship:**

- for seminary/graduate students (see brochure for preapproved list of schools)
- must have been an Alaska resident for at least one year
- must have good membership standing with a recognized congregation of the Alaska Baptist Resource Network (see brochure for specifics)
- maximum amount of scholarship \$5000 (see brochure for specifics)
- must have a complete scholarship packet submitted by April 30, 2022 (see brochure for specifics)
- maximum of five scholarships awarded for 2022 based on fund availability

## **Reynolds Scholarship:**

- for seminary students
- for men who have surrendered to preach after the age of 25 or any applicant man or woman pursuing ministry work after the age of 25
- amount depends on funds available typically only enough for one individual
- contact The Alaska Baptist Foundation for more information and/or receive an application
- no specific due date established. Awarded on a first-come first-served basis upon review and approval of the applicant and their submitted application materials

# First Person: Why we do missions as a family

Once, my wife and I attended a lecture with our then three-year-old son. The speaker was a possible Nobel Prize candidate, and we were at a prestigious university. Our very extroverted son saw one of our friends quietly coming in late and innocently, but boldly and loudly, greeted her with an affectionate term meaning “auntie.” The lecturer, a bit stunned, stopped for a moment and all eyes turned to us. Our son, the only child at the lecture, was smiling and waving to our friend summoning her to come. I prayed, “Oh God, what did I do by bringing him here? Help me!”

Our family has been focusing exclusively on reaching academics and religious leaders in Central Asia for Christ. As far as we know, we are the only people tasked with this specific calling. Those we

are trying to reach are some of the smartest yet most hostile people toward the gospel.

People have asked why we choose to work them when others are more receptive to the gospel.

Despite the difficulty of the calling and the reality that we will likely not see much fruit in our lifetime, we

remain committed. We know that if just a few of these influential leaders and teachers put their faith in Christ, their kingdom impact would be immeasurable. This has been the pattern throughout history (for example, look at the life of the Apostle Paul or Martin Luther).

But our calling is also unique, because from the first time my wife and I started this work, we decided that we were going to do ministry as a family. That was easy without kids. When children came along, we knew it would be more difficult. Including them in our mission work has been worth it, however, because of our heart for the people and our belief that sharing Christ together as a family is a powerful way to model God’s love.

As the people where we live place a high value on family, children, especially males, are considered gifts of God and are highly esteemed. Our parenting styles are very different, and our national friends notice how we choose to guide our children. They see our discipline is different; they see when we

get things right and when we get things wrong. Ministering as a family provides us a way to be vulnerable and seek mercy; it gives our friends the freedom to talk about more than just a lecture that many are required to attend.

It is not just lectures either. More than a few of our friends have started to bring their children to different events and meetings we attend. This means we have a chance to meet more women. We connect not just male-to-male or female-to-female, but family-to-family. Relationships begin, and, in time, we meet with some in homes for meals and fellowship.

Discussion takes place, trust is earned, and we get the privilege of sharing the message of the gospel. Our friends see

how we function as a family, how we see each person as important and made in God’s image, and how we all need God’s mercy, grace and forgiveness through Jesus.

We talk about life issues and the hope we have in Jesus in the context of family. When hard questions arise that surround the differences between Christianity and their religion, we answer

them truthfully, but we do so in the framework of a relationship that affects not just one or two people, but all of us – father-to-father, mother-to-mother, child-to-child. This allows us to be truthful and honest about our beliefs and not about feeling the need to be right or to win an argument. We are seen as friends who genuinely care about them.

Our son’s auntie, a woman who researches cures for diseases such as Alzheimer’s and Parkinson’s, is single and devout in her faith. Being together as a family gives all of us an avenue to share Christ with her. Our son may be the best witness of all. He, without any care in the world, confidently shouts out her name and calls her to come be with him.
