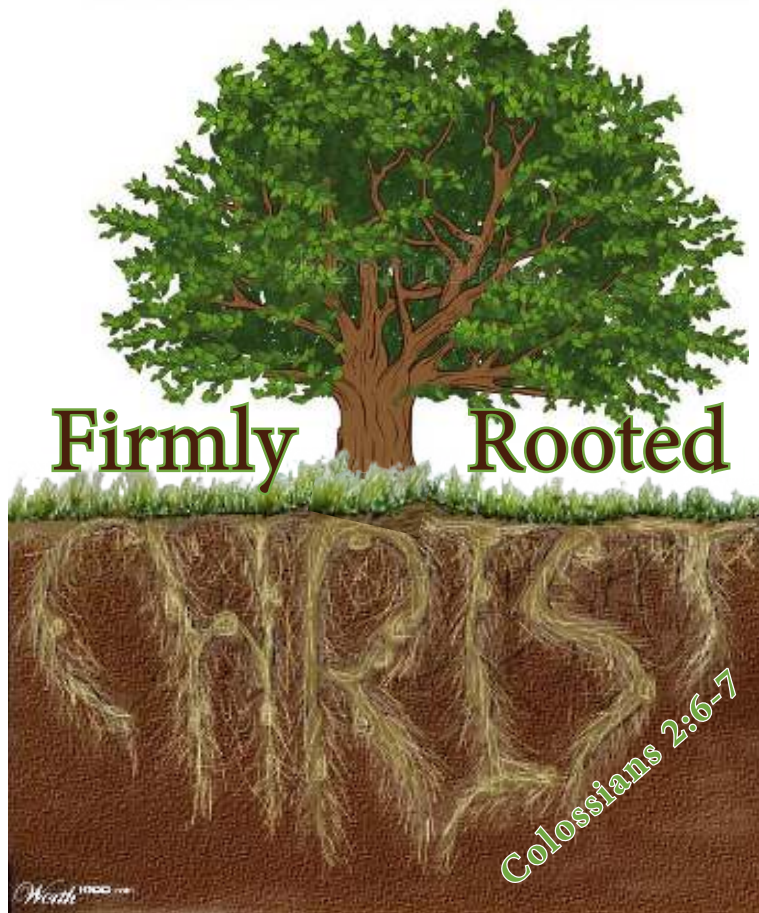

## IN GOD WE TRUST

In the past several months, I have awakened in the morning with the thought, “What in the world is happening to our nation?” I hear about political division, rampant violence in major cities, uncontrolled disregard for national sovereignty as immigrants cross our borders, the escalating rate of inflation, and global conflict. While we have faced these crises in the past, there is anxiety that questions if things will ever return to what we would call normal.

There seems to be an increasing skepticism in America regarding the question, “Is there really a God, and if so, does he really love me?” Polling trends reveal that the percentage of Americans who believe in God or the Bible are in decline that has been consistent for more than a decade. The common phrase that has been on most US coins for more than a century is “In God We Trust.” The intention was to remind citizens that our nation was founded on Christian principles and our trust should remain in the sovereignty of God and not the sovereignty of our nation. However, current events reveal that many people have lost that element of hope.

The question that faces the church of the 21<sup>st</sup> century is not how to hold on to the hope and trust in the One who has redeemed us. It’s not just about maintaining the growth of the local church or denomination. The question we must ask is how to reach that increasing number of skeptics, the hopeless and discouraged members of our communities who have put their trust in someone

or something other than Jesus Christ. How do we offer hope to a nation in crisis?

First, we must remember the promise His Word reveals to all who call Him, Lord. Psalm 20:6-7 tells us that . . . ***The Lord gives victory to his anointed. He answers him from his heavenly sanctuary with the victorious power of his right hand. Some trust in chariots and some in horses, but we trust in the name of the Lord our God.*** Let us not forget whose name we bear.

Second, may we be faithful to what I call the GC2: The Great Commandment (Matt 22:37-39) and the Great Commission (Matt 28:19-20). In response to God’s love, we are commanded to love our neighbor. That can be hard to do when our society is wholly embracing views of sexuality and morality that are condemned in Scripture. We must learn to hate the sin but love the sinner. We must accept the responsibility that Jesus gave to the church in Matthew 16:19 to engage the keys that will open doors and unlock heavenly mysteries.

Third, we must practice the words of Hebrews 10:22-25 to draw near to God and one another; to hold on to the confession of our hope in Christ; to stir one another to love and good deeds; and to not forsake meeting together that we might encourage one another as the final day draws near. That day is coming! Our nation and our world need God today more than ever. Let us show to the world that we trust in the name of the Lord our God!

### How do we offer hope to a nation in crisis?

**Let’s approach [God] with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled [clean] from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let’s hold firmly to the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful; and let’s consider how to encourage one another in love and good deeds, not abandoning our own meeting together, as is the habit of some people, but encouraging [one another;] and all the more as you see the day drawing near.**

## **Pour into Others**

A lady walked up to me and said, “I heard your story from your wife the other day. What a great testimony of God’s work in your life!” I responded, “Thank you.” It is not every day that someone comes to me and asks about my story, but when they do, it gives me an opportunity to ask them about their life. This woman had already indicated by her comment that she was a believer, but, I still asked her about her story. It seemed only fair that since she knew my story, I should know hers.

I was blessed by her story. She is a mom of three, in her thirties, telling me she was born and raised in Alaska. Because she didn’t know the Lord or go to any church through her young upbringing, she made many poor decisions. She had a baby at a young age, and ended up living in an apartment in Anchorage with her child. The couple that managed the apartments were Christians. They taught her the Bible and continued to pour into her life for over two years. Through a set of circumstances she finally saw the light and asked Jesus to forgive her of her sins and invited Jesus into her life. She is now married with two more children. She attends a local church and is blessed by the ministry there. She walks in newness of life in Christ.

This is what stood out to me: a couple poured into her life, shared their faith, witnessed to her and taught her the Bible for two years. Did you catch that? They did this for two years. They didn’t get discouraged or give up. They kept sharing and teaching. These people are no longer living. I wish I could have known them. I wish every church had members who took it upon themselves to reach into people’s lives like this. I even ask this about myself. How many people can I point to that I am really reaching and pouring into? Pastors are pouring into others all the time through their ministry of teaching and Bible studies. That is great. But, if pastors are the

only ones doing it, then we are not reproducing disciples that reproduce disciples.

Matt 28:19-20 tells us to make disciples, teaching them to obey His commandments. It is a reflection of the life of Jesus on this earth. He poured into 12 disciples. They poured into others. It is interesting to

read the New Testament and see how the church grew after Christ ascended. There were large events where people came to know the Lord. There were days that 3,000, then 5,000 came to know Christ. Can you imagine the dilemma facing the disciples? How would

they disciple all of these folks? In addition, more people were being saved daily.

Most pastors and leaders of our churches affirm that churches should make disciples. There are some churches that have a great reputation of leading people to faith and helping them grow spiritually. There are some that go further to help believers become disciple makers. This multiplies the effectiveness of the leaders creating leaders. Does your church have a strategy to help new believers become mature and become proclaimers of the good news? I would love to hear from you about the ways you are doing this. Do you have new believer’s classes? Do you have accountability groups or mentors that encourage member participation in making disciples? Do you have a set of curriculum to help others see how it is done? Please let me know. These are the kinds of ministries others need to hear about.

This summer there have been several churches using evangelism funds to reach out in their community. At the annual meeting I will report on the activities and share all God is doing. God is working in people’s lives, bringing them to faith. I look forward to sharing this report with you. Before our time together in Juneau, let’s see how many people we can meet and ask them about their story. See you soon, it will be here before we know it.



# IMB GOES AGAINST FLOW OF MISSION TRENDS

The International Mission Board stands in stark contrast to current trends in global missions. A recent [Christian Post article](#) cited only 3% of mission work goes to reach the unreached, while in



2021, the IMB sought to focus 81.2% of missionary team efforts among unreached people groups (UPG). Additionally, 90.8% of all IMB teams were focused on at least one UPG, Wilson Geisler the IMB's director of global research shared.

“We often read articles and hear discussions about what is described as the ‘Great Imbalance,’ and how less than 3.5% of all missionary efforts are focused on unreached people groups,” Geisler said. “One of the great things about being with the IMB is that the IMB and [the] Southern Baptist Convention have a long history of getting the gospel to the least reached.”

“In 14.1% of IMB’s people group engagements, IMB personnel and close partners were the only known missionary engagers,” the director of global research added.

The IMB defines a people group as unreached when less than 2% of its population is evangelical Christian (UPG). A people group is unengaged when no evangelical church-planting strategy is being implemented among them (UUPG). People groups are ethnolinguistic groups who share a common language and cultural identity. For strategic purposes, a people group is the largest group within which the gospel can spread without encountering barriers of understanding or acceptance.

The IMB has identified 3,150 people groups that remain unreached and unengaged. Of the 3,150 unengaged unreached people groups, less than 400 have populations exceeding 100,000.



Geisler pointed out that when IMB does focus on reached people groups, it is often because those groups have taken responsibility for the Great Commission. They asked IMB to help train them to go to the least reached. These people group engagements by IMB teams represent over 61% of the total global population.

The [Christian Post reported](#):

*“Many of these people groups live largely inaccessible terrain far-flung corners of South Asia, the Middle East and North Africa, making access to evangelists extremely challenging.”*

*“But beyond the physical barriers, oftentimes, missionaries are faced with cultural and political hardships — including persecution — simply for advancing the Gospel in hostile nations and areas.”*

*“The religions of Islam, Hinduism and others typically dominate in most countries where UPGs live, while other cultures tend to disapprove of conversion to Christianity or other religions.”*

*“These factors account for why some avoid making the effort altogether: of the roughly 400,000 Christian missionaries worldwide, only 3.3% are focused on UPGs, according to The Traveling Team data cited by East-West.”*

In stark contrast to these trends in global missions, the IMB reported in their [2021 Annual Statistical Report](#) that through their teams:

- 93 new people groups and places were engaged.
- 592,408 individuals heard gospel witness.
- 495,550 received an opportunity to respond to the gospel.
- 176,795 new believers were reported.
- 182,112 received leadership training.
- And 22,744 new churches were planted.

IMB President Paul Chitwood shared in the [2022 Global Impact Guide](#), that while the IMB has much to celebrate, there is still much work to be done.

Addressing Southern Baptists, he wrote, “Together, we get to do the most important work in the world to address the problem of lostness. Together, we get to share the good news of Jesus with people and places who have never heard the gospel. Together, we send, sustain, and support missionaries to be steadfastly present around the globe to share that message and plant healthy churches.”

Geisler’s personal takeaway from the article and statistics is that the IMB continues to be the “long-time champion and engager” of the least reached.

“Praying, giving, going and sending with IMB remains the most tangible and practical way to help fix this ‘Great Imbalance,’” he said.

## PARLIAMENTARY CORNER

### What is the “Previous Question”?

The purpose of this motion is to immediately close debate. The making of any subsidiary motions, such as amendments, are also stopped by this motion.

The right to debate a question is a *basic* right. It may NOT be stopped by one person calling for the previous question.

Immediately following the call for the previous question, two things must occur.

1. It must be seconded. If there is no second, the motion dies, and debate continues.
2. If the motion is seconded, a vote is taken on *whether or not to stop debate*. The vote must pass with two-thirds in the affirmative. If less than two-thirds vote in the affirmative, the vote is lost, and debate continues.

This motion is undebatable and unamendable.

How to word it?

Standard form: “I move the previous question.”

Nonstandard forms: “I call for (or call) the question”

“I demand the previous question.”

“I move to close (or end) debate.”

“I move we vote now.”

DISORDERLY form not allowed: “Question!” This motion may not interrupt a person who has the floor.
