

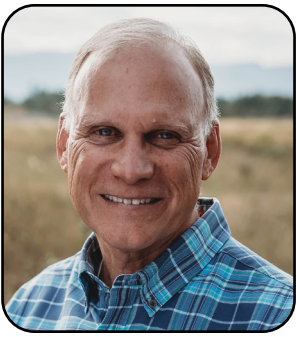

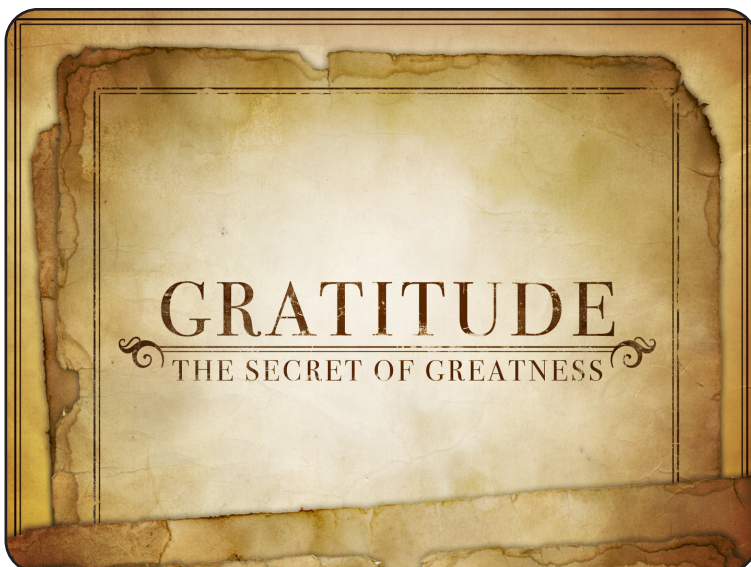
Gratitude!

Medicine on mission: Not one size fits all

John Dina's job description isn't medicine as missions, but he sees his work in community development in Mozambique as one way of doing healthcare missions.

Dina has spent over 30 years on the mission field and now serves as a missionary leader in Africa. This summer, his team completed construction of a well to bring clean water to a school and the surrounding community. This was one of many water wells Dina has been a part of installing. These sources of clean water have a direct effect on the health of villagers, who now avoid water-born illnesses.

Not only is his team focused on meeting essential needs, they use their work to spread the gospel. On each well the team of missionaries and national believers builds, they inscribe in Portuguese – the official language of Mozambique – “God loves you.” But more than leaving the words on the well, the team has proven that they love the people too.

“Anytime I show up or the well team shows up,” Dina said, “we have total access and great rapport because we’ve provided this. There’s a lot of credit that comes when someone does something for them.”

While one part of the team works on the well, others evangelize or focus on discipleship.

Another non-conventional form of healthcare Dina's team uses to show God's love is hospice buckets. The team delivers buckets containing basic items like a toothbrush, toothpaste, sheets, towels, straws that bend, and gloves to equip the family of someone dying (usually of HIV or AIDS) to be able to take care of their loved ones.

Dina always explains that his team brought the bucket, “because God changed my life and I want them to know His love,” before sharing the gospel story.

He continued, “When you show up and show care for their dying loved ones, you can go back any day of the week and say, ‘Can I care for you?’ Love is what conquered all.”

Quoting John 13:35, Dina said, “‘By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.’ How do you show the love of Christ? You want to get to the message, but really, love opens the door to the message.”

Secular degree for gospel impact

Thinking of unique ways to open doors for the gospel is what led Aaron and Olivia Bragg* toward medical missions.

Olivia was in college studying to be a physical therapist when she felt the Lord leading her to missions. Her husband-to-be was studying accounting.

Their church in college and after disciplined them well, and during that period, they caught the Revelation 7:9 vision for reaching the nations. All along, “I had this tension in my heart of whether I should

go to seminary or continue with [physical therapy] school,” Olivia explained.

A few years ago at a Send Conference hosted by the International Mission Board and North American Mission Board, the Lord clarified the direction He wanted the Braggs to go.

At the conference, IMB's message that marketplace skills can be used as an inroad to the gospel took root in their hearts. Their concern of whether to drop out of college or stay the course was addressed.

“We were college kids. We were still immature, and we wanted to go and do something for the world. That's the heart the Lord often gives students in that stage of life. And it's very fruitful if it's disciplined in the right way,” Olivia explained.

She had the desire to “just drop everything for missions and go to Africa or wherever it may be.” But that conference highlighted not to drop out of school.

“We need businesspeople to reach the businesspeople. We need healthcare workers to reach the healthcare workers,” they heard.

“There is such a strategy with healthcare for you to go and enter into these places that other people with only seminary degrees couldn't get into,” she realized for the first time at the conference.

“That was pivotal for us – a breath of fresh air. I could go to a secular school and get a secular degree for the glory of God.”

Aaron feels called to use his de-

gree in accounting in a similar way, to gain access to hard-to-reach places through his trade. Although the couple is still waiting for God to give them the specifics about their calling, they're excited about the opportunities open to them because of their vocations.

Don't quit your day job

Rick Dunbar, an emergency room doctor and chairman of the IMB's newly-formed health strategies advisory group, has found his way to use medicine as missions and keep his day job. Dunbar frequently goes overseas and conducts health clinics. Sometimes those are for IMB personnel and families. Other times, he's aiding existing IMB work and conducting clinics for the community.

He's been doing it since 1993 when “God called me to go back to medical school and take care of people,” he said.

He wants others to join in on the many opportunities that exist to use their medical careers for God's glory as well.

One of the largest hindrances to personal financial health is the millstone effect of excessive debt. In fact debt can have adverse mental and emotional consequences. Research has found that worrying about debt triggers stress which can reduce one's effective resistance to physical and mental health problems.

Impending fear generated from continuous stress manifests in physical symptoms. For instance, the thought of getting a late notice actually produces rapid heartbeat, shortness of breath, headaches, and more. Research indicates that healthy interpersonal relationships can also be negatively affected. Marriage is one example of how debt affects society. Debt limits both the initiation of marriage and serves as a major cause for divorce. Credit card debt is particularly alarming because of its relationship to physical and emotional ailments. According to a 2021 study by Value Penguin the average American family's credit card debt is \$6,270. Some studies indicate that approximately 40 percent of consumers who have credit card debt say it has affected their general happiness, and 20 percent indicate that it negatively impacts their health.

With all of these negative physical and emotional issues to which debt contributes, it is important not to lose hope. There are three primary ways to approach the problem of debt. They are the debt avalanche, debt snowball, and consolidated debt.

1. Debt Avalanche Approach- as the name implies, focuses on the highest consumer interest debt first. While maintaining minimum payments on all debts any extra monies are to be applied to paying off the highest interest debt. For example, if one has three outstanding credit card balances generating interest of 25 percent, 15 percent, and 10 percent respectively, the avalanche approach focuses all additional resources to paying the 25 percent debt first, then moves to the 15 percent and finally the 10 percent debt. From a strictly mathematical perspective, this approach saves the borrower the most money of all methods. The drawback is that it takes longer to achieve, without the benefit of immediate gratification or positive emotional reinforcement.

2. Debt Snowball Approach- is a popular method advocated by Dave Ramsey as part of seven baby steps introduced in his Financial Peace University curriculum. It is the opposite of the avalanche approach in that it focuses on the smallest debt items irrespective of interest rate and diverts any extra funding to paying off the smallest debt first. The process builds on itself by taking the extra money available through eliminating the smallest debt and moving it up to apply to each progressively larger debt. As the snowflakes accumulate they become a larger and larger snowball. Because this method does not take into account the interest effect of debts, but only their size from smallest a largest, it may end up costing the debtor a little bit more. The major benefit is the emotional positive reinforcement of seeing debt disappear and applying extra dollars to progressively larger debt levels which seem more manageable as free cash flow becomes available.

3. Debt Consolidation- is a process whereby individuals with multiple consumer debts at various high interest rates bring together all of these debts under one single payer at a combined lower interest rate. At first glance this may seem a "no-brainer." Nonetheless, remember it's not uncommon for lenders to charge an origination fee that, depending on the amount, could negate much of the benefit. Also, there may be a tendency to become complacent under the new payment arrangement which over a stretched payment horizon can minimize the benefits. Similar to refinancing a mortgage to a lower rate but failing to take the dollar amount of realized savings to pay against the principal of the note.

So which method is best? In the most general and accurate sense: It depends. If one has reached a point in their life where they do not need the benefit of immediate gratification and are extremely disciplined in their commitment the Debt Avalanche approach often results in the greatest amount of savings. In contrast, in light of the very real physical and emotional elements that debt may generate, the Debt Snowball approach may be the more desirable as it factors in more of the psychological/emotional realities that affect many people. The snowball approach is also well-designed to take advantage of positive small successes helping reinforce drive and commitment to achieving the goal of being debt free. Debt Consolidation certainly could have a role to play if the loan origination fees are small. In some cases a hybrid approach, where one's individual debts are categorized between credit card and non-credit card, might be best. In such a case one could use the Debt Snowball approach for non-credit card debt and the Debt Consolidation approach for credit cards. Using the extra money from the debt snowball approach extra principal payments are made on the consolidated debt balance.

As with anything that is new and challenging the main point is to get started. Find something that works for you. If it looks too large, try breaking it up into smaller more manageable steps. Remember, often times its best not to view debt elimination as a competition with others but rather a commitment between yourself and God.

Summary of Actions Approved at the 76th Annual Meeting of the Alaska Baptist Convention/Alaska Baptist Resource Network (ABC/ABRN)

1. Approved the seating of 92 in-person messengers and 14 online messengers for a total voting messenger count of 106 representing 39 churches. There were 39 guests, making a total attendance of 145.
2. Approved the 76th Annual Meeting program with the theme “Stand Firm and Win Life” from Luke 21:19
3. Approved the second vote to adopt the amendments of the ABC/ABRN Articles of Corporation; Alaska Baptist Foundation Articles of Corporation, and the Alaska Baptist Family Services/Birchwood Behavioral Health Articles of Corporation. The amendment is located on page 71 of the 2021 Book of Reports.
4. Adopted the 2020 Assessor’s Report of the ABC/ABRN prepared by Ogburn and White, LLC of Montgomery, Alabama located on pages 27-44 of the 2021 Book of Reports.
5. Adopted the 2022 Proposed Budget located on pages 72-74 of the 2021 Book of Reports. The 2022 budget reflects a 1 percent cost of living increase.
6. Adopted the 2020 Assessor’s Report of the Alaska Baptist Foundation prepared by Ogburn and White, LLC of Montgomery, Alabama located on pages 47-60 of the 2021 Book of Reports.
7. Approved the following Annual Committee recommendation of candidates to serve on the ABC/ABRN Executive Board with terms expiring September 2025: Cliff Day, Steve Hill, Chris Jang, Angela Jones, and Shelby Smith.
8. Approved the following Annual Committee recommendation of candidates to serve on the ABFS/BBH Board of Directors: Arleen Casey, Matthew Clark, Heather Dominguez, Terry Turner, and Polly Rowell. Arleen’s, Matt’s, and Heather’s terms will expire September 2024; and Terry’s and Polly’s terms will expire September 2022
9. Approved the following Annual Committee recommendation of candidates to serve on the ABF Board of Directors; Dustin Shannon and Larry Tong with terms expiring September 2024. This will be Dustin’s second term and Larry’s first term.
10. Approved the Annual Committee recommendation of Kyle McGee to serve on the Constitution and Bylaws Committee with a term expiring September 2024:
11. Approved the preacher for the 77th Annual Meeting to be held September 27-28, 2022, at Glacier Valley Baptist Church, Juneau to be Eugene Williams with Todd Buck as the alternate preacher.
12. Approved the 81st Annual Meeting dates of September 28-30, 2026, to be hosted by First Baptist Church, Anchorage. The Annual Committee’s written report and the list of names and the nominee bios are located on pages 76-77 of the 2021 Book of Reports.
13. Approved the following motion made during Miscellaneous Business regarding the motion made last year to defund NAMB: It is evident that efforts have been made regarding establishing regular communication with the North American Mission Board. The first meeting was conducted on December 2, 2020, by Zoom because of COVID travel protocols in place at the time. The second meeting was held on May 12, 2021, also by Zoom, however little progress has been made toward developing a collaborative and cooperative relationship with the North American Mission Board. Therefore, in a posture of making every attempt to find a mutually acceptable understanding between the Alaska Baptist Resource Network and the North American Mission Board, I move that we forego any action on the original motion approved on September 29, 2020, to retain North American Mission Board Cooperative Program funds for one more year. I request the organizations provide a summary of efforts and proposals to the Executive Board of the Alaska Baptist Resource Network at their scheduled meeting on Monday, May 2, 2022, for a final determination of the action.
14. Elected the following officers to serve a second term: Tom Hoffman, Pastor of Fairview Loop Baptist Church in Wasilla as President; Robert Scott, Pastor of Dillingham Bible Church as First Vice President; Keith Longo, Pastor of First Baptist Church in Soldotna as Second Vice President; and Jody Winquist, member of First Baptist Church in Anchorage as Recording Secretary.
