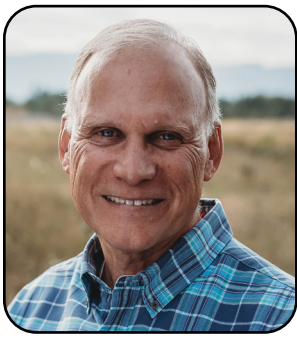

OUT OF THE HEART POURS THANKSGIVING

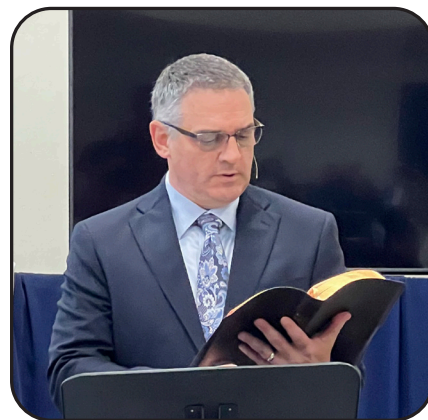

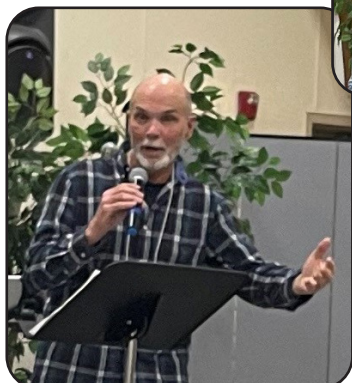

September 27-28, 2022, Summary of Actions of the Annual Meeting of the

Alaska Baptist Convention/Alaska Baptist Resource Network:

1. 85 messengers physically present and 15 messengers online for a total of 100 voting messengers representing 33 Alaska Baptist churches were seated at the 2022 Annual Meeting of the ABC/ABRN.
2. The program of the 77th Annual Meeting was adopted as printed along with any adjustments that may be required. The theme was “Firmly Rooted” based on Colossians 2:6-7.
3. The 2023 Proposed Budget of the ABC/ABRN located on pages 72-74 of the 2022 Book of Reports was approved as printed. The 2022 Book of Reports is filed in the 2022 Annual Meeting master file.
4. The 2022 Annual Committees report located on pages 76-77 of the 2022 Book of Reports was approved with the addition that Tracy Simmons, pastor of Christ Community Church, Anchorage, would replace Guy Mickel’s term of 2024. The 2022 Book of Reports is filed in the 2022 Annual Meeting master file.
5. Incoming Officers are: **Rob Scott**, pastor of Dillingham Bible Church, president; **Phillip Coleman**, pastor of True North Church-Anchorage, first vice president; **Willie Tauanuu**, pastor of University Baptist Church-Anchorage, second vice president; **Cathy Arns**, member of First Baptist Church-Anchorage, recording secretary.
6. Voting ballots are filed in the 2022 Annual Meeting master file.

PARLIAMENTARY CORNER

Unfinished Business

Unfinished business should not be referred to as “old business.” This would incorrectly imply further consideration of business that has been finalized.

Unfinished business refers to questions (i.e. motions) that come over from a prior regular meeting that occurred not more than three months earlier.

Items of business in the category of *Unfinished Business and General Orders*, are taken up in the following order:

1. The question that was pending when the meeting adjourned. That question becomes unfinished business at the next meeting, unless the question was a special order.
2. Any question that was unfinished business at the prior meeting and was not reached before it adjourned in the current meeting.
3. Any questions that were postponed to, or carried over by other means, or had been set for a particular hour but were not reached before it adjourned. These are taken in the order in which the general orders were made.
4. Matters that were postponed to, or otherwise made general orders for the present meeting. These are taken in the order in which they were made.

IMB to host annual Missions College

The International Mission Board will host Missions College on Jan. 4-7, 2023, near Richmond, Virginia.

Missions College is a training event for pastors, church leaders, mission trip participants and church members engaged in missions, or people who are interested in partnering with IMB teams. Missions College centers around 11-hour learning tracks led by missionaries with extensive field experience. Participants will choose one of the following tracks:

- Foundations for Mission
- Missions Scope
- Cross-Cultural Evangelism and Discipleship
- Displaced Peoples
- Using Oral Methods for Discipleship and Leadership Development
- Global Cities
- Strategy Coaching (for mission team leaders involved in church planting)

One of Missions College's most popular tracks is Cross-Cultural Evangelism and Discipleship.

CROSS-CULTURAL EVANGELISM AND DISCIPLESHIP.

The people we are trying to reach with the gospel have radically different perspectives on the world. Learn about worldview differences and the danger of syncretism to help you evangelize cross-culturally. Practice gospel presentations that can be adapted to different people groups, and that you can teach to others.

Also, learn about short and long-term discipleship needs and develop a plan for discipling believers in various contexts. Led by field missionaries Joel Williams, who serves in the Americas, and Jeremy Hollie, who serves in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Also included at Missions College are breakout sessions and daily worship times led by keynote speakers.

Participants will choose three of the following 90-minute breakout sessions.

- The Sending Church
- Culturally Appropriate Gospel Presentations
- Introduction to Storying
- Partnering from the Backseat: Avoiding Dependency
- Short-term Trips
- *Ethnodoxology*
- Prayer Strategies
- Community Health Lessons for Short-term Trips

- Going to the Nations with IMB
- Next Generation Missions

"We are asking the Lord, by His grace, to use the powerful testimonies and deep experiences of our IMB field missionaries to teach and mentor Mission College participants," Lloyd Rodgers said. Rodgers serves as a trainer in the Americas.

Participants from last year shared how the Lord used the time to show how they can be involved in the missions task.

"The biggest thing we are going to go back and share is that anyone can come here, even lay people, whatever position you have in your church, you have something you can give. IMB really shows you through the breakout sessions and the classes that there are so many ways to fit in."

"Missions College has given me a deeper sense of the message that was given to us in Luke that we should make sure we are spreading the Word and using the tools that God has blessed us with. I've learned a lot."

"I am so excited to go back and talk about the opportunities there are to share Christ, the opportunities we have with IMB that we're learning about. It's already changed me spiritually."

Rodgers, who is one of the event's organizers, added the

IMB's intent to ignite a passion for the lost in the hearts of believers. "Our desire is to see God glorified by learning the skills needed to respond cross-culturally to lostness, the greatest problem in the world. Our prayer is that Missions College will anchor in the heart of each participant the biblical mandate to be steadfastly present among people and places where Jesus is not named or known," Rodgers said.

The cost for Missions College is \$249 per person. The fee includes training, materials, lodging for three nights and meals.

My Missions Story — Barbour Baptist Association volunteers give, receive blessings from Alaska partnership

Barbour Baptist Association missions volunteers traveled in July to Palmer, Alaska, as part of an ongoing partnership between Alabama and Alaska Baptists.

In 2021, the Alabama Baptist State Board of Missions announced a new five-year partnership with the Alaska Baptist Resource Network.

Volunteer mission teams from Alabama Baptist churches are encouraged to provide support for a variety of needs, including helping with construction projects at churches and Christian camps, assisting with Vacation Bible School or backyard Bible clubs and a variety of other outreach ministries.

Don Hatcher, director of missions for Barbour Baptist Association, and Richard Harvey, pastor of Cross Baptist Church in Eufaula, heard of the effort and discussed putting together a team from Barbour County.

Finalizing plans

In March, Harvey announced a preplanning meeting and solicited volunteers from association churches.

By May, a team of 11 volunteers from three Barbour Association churches began to finalize plans for the trip. Team members included Aliza Chambers; Ken and Kath-eren Stanfield; Harvey and his sons, Graham and Wesley Harvey; and Kevin Phinney, from Cross Baptist Church in Eufaula; Mary Ellen Gatlin, from Parkview Baptist Church in Eufaula; and Brooke Hall; Ashley McCraney and her daughter, Hadley Kate McCraney, from Evergreen Baptist Church in Clayton.

The Barbour Association team assisted First Baptist Church Palmer with VBS activities.

The team traveled July 21 and on July 23 decorated the church campus and set up rooms to prepare for VBS.

Bruce Rowell, pastor of FBC Palmer, said the church had received more than double any previous year's preenrollment — more than 90 children.

Throughout the week of July 25–29, VBS average attendance was approximately 70 children each day. Barbour Association volunteers led in worship, Bible studies, missions, crafts and music.

The team stayed in the facilities of the church campus. One family invited the team to join their rather competitive (but really fun) kickball game. Other families and individuals brought meals of smoked salmon and halibut, shrimp fried rice and much more.

Exploring the region

The team also enjoyed visiting several Alaska landmarks, including the Matanuska-Susitna Valley (Mat-Su Valley) region where Palmer is located. Members of the team hiked a local mountain trail called the Butte.

They also explored Hatcher's Pass where they hiked up the mountain to a beautiful lake of crystal clear waters created from the melting snow. They even had a snowball fight at this higher elevation with breathtaking views of the valley below.

To the south, the team was able to travel back through Anchorage and down Seward Highway to the Alaska Wildlife Conservation Center.

There they saw moose, caribou, elk, bison, reindeer, wolves, bears and a variety of other creatures.

The team also traveled through the Anton Anderson Memorial Tunnel, the longest highway tunnel (2.5 miles) in North America, to reach the port city of Whittier.

The quaint city of Palmer is active in these summer months. The team enjoyed strolling through the Friday Fling outdoor market held each week during the summer months. Eating local cuisine and shopping for souvenirs from local arts and crafts vendors was a highlight, volunteers said.

Palmer also is home to the Alaska State Fair. The rich, fertile soil of the valley and the extensive length of sunlight — 20 hours or more — in the long Alaskan summer days makes for the perfect climate to grow some of the largest vegetables in the world. Some of these vegetables are world-record size.

'Fruitful'

There can be no doubt that while the team came to be a blessing to the congregation of FBC Palmer, they left having received a greater blessing.

The trip was fruitful on many levels.

Children's hearts were touched, and many lives were changed for eternity because of the good news of Jesus Christ.

Many families were introduced to the ministries of the church, and follow-up is planned to continue to reach out to these families.

Team members are looking forward to next summer and anticipate that this partnership between Alabama and Alaska Baptist churches will continue to thrive. The work of impacting people's lives with the hope of the gospel is still desperately needed around the world.

Each site, of which there are six in the Anchorage area, is responsible for setting up and running their distribution site and collecting/purchasing all of the sides for the blessing boxes.

Each box contains the following:

Canned Corn: 2-3 cans	Dinner Rolls
Green beans: 2-3 cans	Margarine: 1 pound
Cranberry sauce: 1 can	Stuffing mix: 1 box

Aluminum Roasting Pan

The Food Bank provides the Turkey, and a five pound bag of potatoes and apples.
The New Hope Baptist site is projecting to distribute 2200 boxes this year.

The Ask:

New Hope would appreciate area congregations hosting a food drive to collect the above needed items. With the projected number being 2200, the following items are needed to fill the boxes:

2200 Roasting Pans
2200 cans of cranberry sauce, stuffing and dinner rolls-each
4400 packs of gravy
6600 cans of green beans
6600 cans of corn

The Blessing takes place this year on 11/21/22 -the Monday before Thanksgiving.

Inside Aspen Cottage, drywall needs to be replaced and painted. There is past flooding

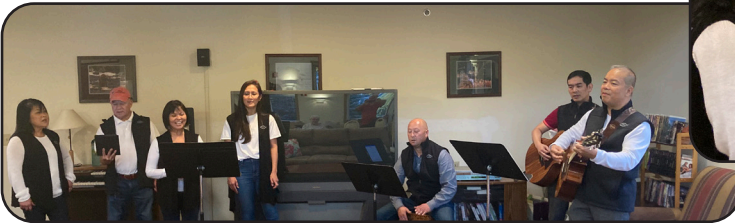
damage to the client bedrooms and laundry room that needs repair. There are plumbing issues that have required attention for many years and are becoming urgent.

Mema was a beautiful woman, independently minded, level-headed and even-keeled, full of ever-ready and ever-generous hospitality, and unfailingly loyal.

Surprisingly, for her staid demeanor, she was also very adventurous. It was she who convinced Dad to move to Alaska in the early '40s, just 20 years old, in the middle of a world war, not a paved street in the entire state, pregnant with her first child, and after they decided to make the move had to convince Dad to take on the adventure when he got cold feet.

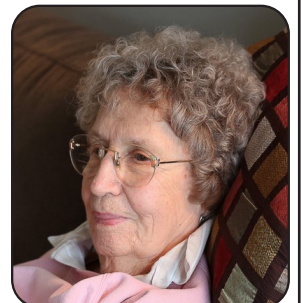
Mom flew up to Alaska on a military transport, and Dad followed in a steamship. She was a pioneering Alaskan who fell in love with “the dropping off place” and whose heart was always at home here from the moment she arrived.

Even in my youth, when I felt that my treatment was unfair, or in my adolescence, when I felt my whipping was too severe, and all

throughout my adulthood, I have known that beneath and above everything else, I was always deeply, deeply loved.

To a fault, and also to her credit, she refused to see anything bad in other people, or if she saw it, to say anything about it. It was always clear to me that she had her own mind, but if there was anything negative to be said about someone, you would never hear it from her.

Mom's faith in her Savior was unshakable, as was her commitment to serve Him in thought, and word, and deed, and I know she is enjoying her reward in heaven now. But here on earth, though time will surely temper our sadness, she has left an empty space that for us nothing else could ever fill, and by us she will be forever missed.



First Person: Warriors to Missionaries

Once fierce tribe now spreads gospel

Only a few decades ago, the Bugkalot people were one of the fiercest tribes in the Philippines, known for beheading their enemies. No outsider who contacted the tribe survived, and the people around them lived terrified of them.

Then, in the 1950s, the gospel slowly took root in the tribe after some of the leaders met believers and came to faith. The first believers established churches that grew and multiplied as more and more Bugkalot people chose to follow Christ.

My family was among the missionaries who moved to the Philippines to disciple and train Bugkalot believers. I grew up in a tribal village as the Bugkalot church began to multiply.

When my husband and I joined the IMB and moved to the Philippines in 2005 to work with the Agta, another unreached tribe, God planted the idea in our

hearts that the best people to reach the Agta would be other tribal people. We immediately thought of the Bugkalot, and as soon as we could, we hiked back to the village I grew up in to speak with many of the men my dad disciplined.

God used that conversation as the catalyst for Bugkalot believers catching a vision to take the gospel beyond their tribal borders. Over the next several years, we worked together with other partnering missionaries to help the Bugkalot establish their own sending organization. Thus far, they have sent more than 20 believers to serve as missionaries among the Agta.

It's been amazing to watch gospel transformation come full circle. A tribe that used to bring death wherever they went became passionate partners in the gospel.

For a people group that is very family-centered and isolated from the rest of the Philippines, it is a big sacrifice to leave tribal territory, learn a new language and culture, and be separated from loved ones. God used their sacrifice in powerful ways. More than 20 churches have been planted among the Agta.

As the Bugkalot church grew in their burden for the unreached, God inspired them to reach the lost and neglected in their own community as well. For example, everyone thought a village had been completely wiped out by in-fighting within the tribe decades earlier, but church leaders heard a few survivors relocated.

Though the survivors had since passed away, the church sent a delegation to their children and grandchildren. They apologized for the violence and tragedy decades earlier and shared the gospel.

It's been wonderful to see how Bugkalot churches have been strengthened as they focused on the unreached, even though they've sent out some of their best leaders.

Now that work among the Agta is more established, we are working to expand the model of tribal people reaching other tribal people to other groups in the Philippines. It's been a privilege to be involved in the partnership God has used to build His church in the Philippines, and to have a front row seat to the Bugkalot's story over the decades.

For so long, the definition of "finishing the task" has been when the local church can stand on its own. But it's not truly finished until they can come alongside and actually be part of reaching other peoples with the gospel, and it's been really exciting to watch the Bugkalot catch that vision.
