









od is doing some incredwible things in the North African region of Kabylia. Neither Islam nor the heightened level of persecution aimed at believers like Pastor Karim\* can stop His desire to bring the Kabvle Berbers to salvation through Jesus Christ. Southern Baptists are privileged to be used by God in this region and to witness the power of the Holy Spirit among this people group. For just \$4, Christian workers can buy a New Testament in the Kabyle language. When they read the living Word of God, they are filled with a boldness and strength that comes only from the Lord.

When Karim reads the words of the apostle Paul from his Bible, he identifies with an insight greater than most Christians in the U.S. will ever have. Like Paul, Karim has been beaten, threatened with death and spit upon. He's witnessed the intense persecution of fellow believers and walked through the ashes and rubble of the building where his church worshipped. Still his faith, and the faith of fellow Christians, remains strong. This is not a church in hiding. This is a church witnessing and evangalizing its own people.

gelizing its own people, even those who persecute them.

For every Bible that's taken away and burned, they pray that God will provide the means to replace it. Through our faithful giving to Lottie Moon, we provide not only Bibles in the Kabyle language but Christian radio

and television programs and an ongoing structure that allows Christian workers

to engage Northern African and Middle Eastern peoples.

# November 15-16, 2010, Alaska Baptist Convention (ABC) Executive Board Meeting Summary of Board Actions

- 1. Approved the new organizational structure of the ABC Executive Board.
- 2. Approved the minutes of the May 11, 2010, ABC Executive Board meeting.
- 3. Approved the minutes of the August 2, 2010, Special-Called ABC Executive Board meeting.
- 4. Approved the minutes of the 65th Annual Convention meeting.
- 5. Approved the October 2010 financial reports.
- 6. Approved the 2011 housing allowances for Mike Procter, Jimmy Stewart, Don Shannon, Butch Strickland, and Alan Dial.
- 7. Approved reimbursing David Baldwin up to \$10,000 for his moving expenses to Fairbanks, AK.
- 8. Elected Jae McKee (member of First Baptist Church, Anchorage) to complete the term of John Piepmeier on the ABC Executive Board, which expires 2013.
- 9. Elected Tim Hoffman (member of Hillside Baptist Church) to serve on the Alaska Baptist Family Services Board with term expiring on 2013.
- 10. Approved adding the following to Policies and Procedures Manual Part II, XIV. RETIREMENT: "D. The Convention may allow the retiring Executive Director to establish and fund an escrow account to pay for the retiring Executive Director's insurance premiums, dental premiums, and other medical policies."
- 11. Approved a State Mission Offering grant of \$3,170.50 be given to the True North Church for their "Coffee House Theology" outreach.
- 12. Approved The Church of New Beginnings be the recipient of church pastoral assistance as follows:
  - \$500 a month in 2011
  - \$400 a month in 2012
  - \$300 a month in 2013
  - \$200 a month in 2014
  - \$100 a month in 2015
  - \$0 a month in 2016

This will come from budget line item # 5342 Church Assistance.

- 13. Approve the following offering goals for 2011:
  - Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions \$100,000
  - Valeria Sherard State Mission Offering for Alaska \$75,000
  - Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for International Missions \$150,000
- 14. Approved motion to adjourn the ABC Executive Board meeting at 10:55 a.m. on Tuesday, November 16, 2010.

### Technology and the ABC

The Alaska Baptist Convention (ABC) saw the debut of internet live "streaming" as people from Anchorage to Pennsylvania remotely participated in the 65th annual meeting of the ABC held at First Baptist Church, Wasilla, September 27-29, 2010. Sixty-seven visitors logged a total of 57 hours of viewing, averaging about one hour of viewing per person.

Give a gift that is simple, flexible, versatile, will not be returned, will be appreciated and continue to help others long after you are gone. The Alaska Baptist Foundation has several suggestions for you. If you want a gift deduction for your 2010 taxes, it must be done by December 31, 2010.



## Make a Gift of Stock Rather than Cash!

When a donor writes a check for \$10,000, he reduces his federal tax bill by \$3,500 (assuming he is in the top federal tax bracket). If instead he gives stock worth \$10,000 (which he bought for \$5,000 years earlier), he will get the same income tax deduction, and avoid paying \$750 in capital gains tax, for a total of \$4,250 in reduced taxes. In each case, he has parted with \$10,000, but by giving

stock, he has reduced his after-tax cost of giving from \$6,500 to \$5,750, a 12 percent decrease. If you consider state taxes, the example is even more compelling. Making gifts of appreciated assets instead of writing checks is the simplest tool in the philanthropic "toolbox" and one that most clients do not use. Remember, tax planning should never be the prime motivation for charitable giving.



# Holding the ropes!

People have asked what I plan to do in my retirement and I answer Nancy and I are going to visit family in the lower 48 states and wear out our welcome. They are not used to seeing us for more than a few days a year. Then we will return to Fairbanks to live. I also hope to continue assisting Alaska Baptist churches with stewardship and estate planning.

Looking back through the Alaska Baptist Foundation (ABF) "Builder" from the last ten years, I came upon a story I used in the December 2001 issue, at the completion of my first year with the Alaska Baptist Convention and ABF. In the article, I explained how I viewed our Foundation. On January 9, 1873 a small group of believers met on the widow Wallis' back porch in Kettering, England. These people were members of the Baptist Missionary Society (BMS), newly formed at the insistence of a young pastor named William Carey. This meeting was the awakening of Baptists to their responsibility for Christian stewardship through global missions. That evening, the BMS met to choose their first missionary. To no one's surprise, they chose Carey and felt led to adopt India as their first mission field. Andrew Fuller, one of the individuals present, wrote: "we saw there was a gold mine in India, but it seemed almost as deep as the center of the earth. Who will venture to explore it?" "I will go down," said Cary to his brethren on that fateful day, "but remember vou must hold the **ropes**." This is what the ABF is all about – "holding the ropes" -- serving Alaska Baptists to see that God's work continues until Jesus comes.

The ABF is not a fundraiser, it is a ministry – one to encourage Baptists to tithe their estates to God's work through Baptist causes. It is also a ministry to present the Gospel message and make disciples. The ABF is helping to "hold the ropes" for mission work in local churches, associations, Alaska and the world. It is a tool for Alaska Baptists to use to reach Alaska, North

America and the world with the Gospel.

An article in the April 2010 issue of "Give & Take" (published by The Sharpe Group, Memphis, Tennessee) said, "Why encourage people to make charitable gifts when the economy, or the reporting of it, is so bad? Charitable gifts remain relatively steady in challenging economic times for two primary reasons. First, actuarial realities continue regardless of economic conditions. As people pass away and their estates settle, gifts continue to be received and can represent the difference between a budget shortfall and a surplus in a given year. Additionally, after extended periods of economic slowdown, history reveals that gifts gradually tend to assume greater importance and represent larger percentages of individual gift income. Conversely, during times when the economy is booming and stock markets are at their peak, gift income tends to represent a smaller percentage of overall giving."

I learned that during lean times, people seem to consider their own mortality. During boom times they seem to not have time for thinking about their future as it relates to estate planning. Some comments I have heard are "why should I look at estate planning?", "I don't have much and there is little value to what I have", "I am still young, I can do this later", "what you are talking about is for older people". While some of the comments may have truth in them, the fact is if you do not have a Last Will and Testament, the state of Alaska will dictate what happens to your valuables, estate and under-aged children.

No matter if you are young, middle aged or old, take time to plan where you want your estate to go. There are ways you can impact Kingdom work and your family long after you are gone. You can "hold the ropes." The Cooperative Program and ABF are "holding the ropes" for mission work.
