

Pete and Holly Kuhn New Hope Community Church

Moving to Juneau for work, Pete and Holly Kuhn felt the Lord's leadership to plant a church in downtown Juneau. Currently, there are churches in the downtown area, but few would be considered evangelical, so the need was identified. Since the first of the year, the Cooperative Program (CP) has assisted them with church planting funds for New Hope Community Church. In addition to New Hope, Pete has started a Bible study/chapel at the mine where he works. Your congregation's mission giving through the CP helps the Kuhns with this new congregation in Juneau, and to minister to those who work at the mine. Pete and Holly are a "face" of the Cooperative Program.

Among Alaska Baptist churches, mission work is supported by your congregation's financial gifts through Cooperative Mission giving. When churches send their Cooperative Mission gifts to the Alaska Baptist Convention, 64 percent of that money stays in Alaska, and 36 percent of the money is forwarded to the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee in Nashville, Tennessee for distribution to causes listed in the budget. The Cooperative Mission monies remaining in Alaska provide funds so Alaska Baptists can partner with the North American Mission Board to fund six jointlyappointed career missionary positions, support over 20 other mission ministries, and help provide various other training opportunities. Everything that comes in contact with the Alaska Baptist Convention has been touched in some way by the Cooperative Mission Offering. That is why Cooperative Mission giving is so important. It impacts every mission and ministry in Alaska Baptist work.

Alan Dial, Alaska Native Church Planter Catalyst

'n May of this year, as Babs and I returned from the Ministers and Spouses Retreat in Healy, we came back to Anchorage the long way via the village of Tok. Tok is a crossroad with a village wrapped around it in the Interior, about four hours from Fairbanks, six or seven from Anchorage and $2\frac{1}{2}$ from the border of Canada. About 1250 folks live in Tok, catering to the summertime RV'ers enroute to just about anyplace else in Alaska. In Tok you refuel the RV and the stomach (Fast Eddy's and Beaver Fever are my suggestions...although Three-Bears grocery store has the greatest Apple Fritter I've ever eaten) and turn left for Anchorage and Kenai or go straight toward Fairbanks. At one time, the Chamber of Commerce advertised Tok as the "Coldest Continuously Occupied Place in North America." We are about to find out if that is reality or hyperbole.

It was under the guidance of Alaska Baptist Convention (ABC) leadership that we took the long way home and at their direction surveyed Tok to come up with a strategy for the building (old Gateway Baptist Church/ FBC Tok) and for reaching the indigenous populations in the area. We came, we saw, we asked, we visited, we wrote and then we returned. Babs was smitten with the place, I was encouraged and the boys liked the idea of the city park across the street from the old building. The facility is in good shape; First Baptist Church, Delta Junction has invested a lot of time and energy in keeping it up, and with a minimum investment we will be able to reestablish the church or repurpose the building. But it is time to rethink our strategy in



Tok. What are we here for? What is our goal? There are good evangelical churches in Tok, so duplicating their effort would be not be smart. What is missing is a strengthened discipleship strategy and a place for Alaska Native People to train for the ministry and to prepare them to minister in their villages. Epiphany! So the strategy is to repurpose the facility, creating a mission resource and training center that will birth churches in the approximately 45 villages from Delta Junction to Whitehorse in the Yukon Territory, Canada. We returned to Anchorage, wrote a proposal and waited for the two leaders in my "chain-of-command" to respond. They liked it. They let me present the idea to the ABC Board of Trustees and surprise! They liked it too.

The next need was to find a family that could and would go to Tok. One morning Mike Procter asked me if Babs and I would consider going...I pondered it...gave him the standard Baptist answer that we would pray about it, went home and shared the decision with Babs. She liked it too. We didn't give up the old job -- just added the new responsibility to it. Our summer calendar was already full and we had

to fit this move into a schedule that had me out-oftown and out-of-state most of the summer. Plus, our daughter-in-law was expecting a baby and needed to stay with us in Anchorage the months of June and July before heading back to King Cove. We started moving to Tok – one trip up with a full truck and trailer, unload, turn around...repeat. The apartment in the back of the existing building is functionally complete. The sanctuary is under renovation...the dorm rooms are studded out and sheetrocked, lighted and ready for paint and bunk beds. The visiting family rooms are ready for furniture and the new bath and laundry is in progress. We have already entertained vision teams and expect to have a full schedule of mission teams next summer. Hopefully, training classes will start in October but we may need to postpone until early 2014. God moves fast when He decides to move!

We hope to evangelize the Athabaskan and First Nations (Canada) Peoples and see God raise indigenous leadership for ministry. We want to enlist, equip, encourage and educate lay leaders and mentor them as they start biblically and culturally correct churches in "THEIR" villages. We also want a place for new missionaries to come and work with us in preparation for their assignment in Bush Alaska – sort of like a missionary "boot-camp." In the summer months, teams from around Alaska and Outside can stay at the center, work in the villages and reflect the presence of God in their lives. Two of the rooms will be set aside as family rooms for those coming with their children, or missionaries coming to depressurize from ministry. Will it work? October is Pastor Appreciation Month and I hope your congregation plans on doing something to express appreciation for your pastoral staff.

Often I am asked how a congregation can show appreciation for their pastoral staff. The following from Diana Davis might be helpful:

- Lots of letters. On Sunday before Pastor Appreciation Day, distribute stamped envelopes addressed to the pastor. An instruction note invites each church member to write and mail a personal note of encouragement and appreciation to the pastor this week.
- Very merry commentary. Purchase a full set of Bible commentaries. Allow various groups, such as Bible classes, committees or church organizations, to present one book of the set, individually wrapped with their personal notes of appreciation on the inside pages.
- Million M&Ms. Think of one small thing your pastor enjoys -- M&Ms, fishing lures, coffee, etc. Ask each member to bring that item on Sunday, i.e. one bag, any size, of M&Ms. Supply extras for guests or forgetful members.
- Thirty days of appreciation. Use an October calendar to schedule volunteers for a month-long schedule of surprise treats. Each day of the month, the pastor will receive a surprise token of appreciation from a church member, committee or group within the church. The tributes will vary widely -- a balloon delivery, shoe shine, an apple pie, a gift. After a whole month of pleasant surprises, won't your pastor feel appreciated?
- A couple other ideas. Give him an extra day off -have someone watch the kids and treat your pastor and his wife to a dinner at a local restaurant.

Matt 9:38 Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth labourers into his harvest. Luke 11:5-8 And he said unto them, Which of you shall have a friend, and shall go unto him at midnight, and say unto him, Friend, lend me three loaves; For a friend of mine in his journey is come to me, and I have nothing to set before him? And he from within shall answer and say, Trouble me not: the door is now shut, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot rise and give thee. I say unto you, Though he will not rise and give him, because he is his friend, yet because of his importunity he will rise and give him as many as he needeth.

"The blessing to be asked will not be less. Every believer is a labourer; there is not one of God's children who has not been redeemed for service, and has not his work waiting. It must be our prayer that the Lord would so fill all His people with the spirit of devotion, that not one may be found standing idle in the vineyard. Wherever there is a complaint of the want of helpers, or of fit helpers in God's work, prayer has the promise of a supply. There is no Sunday school or district visiting, no Bible reading or rescue work, where God is not ready and able to provide. It may take time and importunity, but the command of Christ to ask the Lord of the harvest is the pledge that the prayer will be heard: 'I say unto you, he will arise and give him as many as he needeth.""*

While the church in Antioch was worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit instructed them to separate Saul and Barnabas for the work to which the Lord had called them. The church played an integral part in the call. They were worshiping, fasting and praying. Let's continue to pray that God would send laborers and use us to discover, develop, and deploy them.

Safety Deposit Box vs. Fireproof Home Safe

What is the best way to secure against the risk of loss for items of great value or importance? There is no single answer to this question, but for the sake of this discussion, two common solutions are a safety deposit box and fireproof home safe.

Many banks and credit unions offer safety deposit boxes with annual costs ranging from \$50 - \$400 depending on the size of the box and where it is located. A list of suggested valuables to put in a safety deposit box is:

- insurance policies
- birth, marriage and death certificates
- adoption papers and divorce decrees
- · deeds, titles, mortgage papers and lease contracts
- military records and citizenship papers
- stock and bond certificates
- videotape or DVD inventory of your home and all its contents

This is not an exhaustive list and value is subjective to each individual.

Many states impose a lockdown on safety deposit boxes following the death of the owner. This can make gaining access to contents of a safety deposit box extremely difficult, often requiring a court order. For this reason some items should not be kept in a safety deposit box:

- originals of wills, trusts and power of attorney documents
- medical care directives
- funeral or burial instructions
- cash (cash kept in a safety deposit box is not insured by financial institutions)

Those items are best kept in a fireproof safe so contents can be accessed in the case of incapacitation or death.

There are clear advantages and disadvantages of each method and each individual must evaluate the best means to secure personal assets.

The best solution for storing personal valuables can vary between individuals and may certainly involve a combination of a safety deposit box and personal fireproof safe. If an individual chooses this type of combined approach, it is recommended a key to the safety deposit box be kept in the fireproof safe. A safety deposit box key can be difficult to replace.
