






The training will emphasize the development of leaders, and principles in multiplying groups. Steve has been the Sunday school team leader for the Georgia Baptist Convention and has produced a series resulting from research conducted throughout Georgia about growth in churches through Bible study. 

What pastors need to know about Boomers
