Annie Armstrong: The business of missions

The first corresponding secretary of Woman's Missionary Union, Annie Armstrong, was born in Baltimore, Md., July 11, 1850, and lived most of her life in the same house. After her conversion at age 19 at Seventh Street Baptist Church in Baltimore, Armstrong enthusiastically joined in mission work and social ministry.

Armstrong never married. Instead, she devoted her life to advancing the cause of Christian missions and benevolence work. She is considered the founder of the Ladies Bay View Mission for poor women, was founding member and 24-year president of the woman's Home Mission Society of Maryland, corresponding secretary and chief architect of the Maryland Baptist Mission Rooms, corresponding secre-

tary of WMU from 1888 to 1906, and manager of "...she devoted her life to advancing the Aged Men and Aged Women's Homes of Baltimore 20 years. Her vision

also organized a campaign to raise \$3,000 for a new ward to a Baptist hospital in China. Finally, she redoubled her efforts to discharge an earlier WMU

mission and social work among immigrants in Baltimore, at least two missions and an orphanage for African-Americans in Baltimore, ministry to Native American tribes in the Southwest, schools in Appalachia and numerous successful fundraising strategies for the Baptist denomination.

Annie Armstrong once mused if she had been a man, she would have been successful at business. "I believe I have some ability in this line," she stated. A colleague observed Armstrong was "energetic, resourceful, persevering, trained in the management of large affairs, of masterly mind and a born leader." She was the financial and organizational mastermind behind WMU, the Baptist mission society she helped establish in 1888. Since women of her generation had virtually no access to business careers, Armstrong applied her considerable talent to the "business" of WMU. She was the quintessential missionary professional. She utilized accounting, marketing, promotion, advertising, publishing and mass communica-

plete several key projects. One long-awaited dream

was realized with the opening of the Margaret Home

for children of missionaries in Greenville, S.C. Some

missionaries had difficulty securing an education for

their children on certain mission fields. The Margaret

home provided a safe place for children to attend high

school and college in the United States. Armstrong

During Armstrong's tenure, WMU developed from a gathering of 32 delegates in 1888 to an organization representing thousands of Southern Baptist women in more than 20,000 churches. When her tenure was completed, WMU had 4,387 state women's societies, 1,500 Sunbeam Bands for children and 618 Young Women's Auxiliaries. From 1888 to 1906, annual mission receipts more than doubled, and the WMU operating revenue grew from \$400 to \$8,187. WMU became a fine-tuned network of women, with strong avenues of communication, capable of raising large sums of money in relatively short periods of time. After she left national WMU, Armstrong focused all of her energies on her home church and the social service ministries in Baltimore. She never accepted another denominational post. In her 1913 history of WMU, Fannie Heck wrote that the organization owes its success to Annie Armstrong more than any other person.

Death, where is your sting?" (Holman Christian Standard Bible) Sin is the sting that results in death, and the law gives sin its power. But thank God! From the March 27, 2014 issue of Rolling Stone magazine, the following interview is excerpted:

"You're a technologist, but a lot of your work now with the foundation has a moral dimension. Has your thinking about the value of religion changed over the years? The moral systems of religion, I think, are superimportant. We've raised our kids in a religious way; they've gone to the Catholic Church that Melinda goes to and I participate in. I've been very lucky, and therefore I owe it to try and reduce the inequity in the world. And that's kind of a religious belief. I mean, it's at least a moral belief.

Do you believe in God? I agree with people like Richard Dawkins that mankind felt the need for creation myths. Before we really began to understand disease and the weather and things like that, we sought false explanations for them. Now science has filled in some of the realm – not all – that religion used to fill. But the mystery and the beauty of the world is overwhelmingly amazing, and there's no scientific explanation of how it came about. To say that it was generated by random numbers, that does seem, you know, sort of an uncharitable view [laughs]. I think it makes sense to believe in God, but exactly what decision in your life you make differently because of it, I don't know."

Can you guess who is being interviewed? One of the richest, most influential men in the world! Before I tell you who it is, re-read what he says about a "moral dimension" - about it being "superimportant." This individual attends a Catholic church with his wife and has raised his children in that way. He says, because he has been lucky, he is obligated to help the world. So, if you are unlucky, you don't owe the world anything? It is disconcerting that a person can attend church and believe morals are important, but not believe in the moral law giver. This particular "super" intellectual agrees publicly with Richard Dawkins because he doesn't want to be labeled a right wing conservative. He ends the interview with "I think it makes sense to believe in God," but won't publicly commit to a belief in God. It is this type of influential person who is pouring a lot of money into our economy to create systems he feels are beneficial to the world. You should read the rest of the article to see what Bill Gates thinks is important. He does make some good points, but most of what he says is grounded in a conflict between "Mother Earth" and capitalism.

Our youth are facing a dilemma to which we have a solution. Training Teens Today (T3) is a program targeted at nurturing future leaders of our church, grounding them with a solid biblical foundation, and helping them to avoid the pitfalls of secularism! I have been challenged recently to find grace exhibited by those around me. It has been quite an enlightening experience. I have found grace in areas where you would expect it, but in others where it is the last thing you would expect. I have seen grace in circumstances where you would normally find bitterness or even disgust; recently I found grace in a place where you would expect to find it, but from a person who might surprise you. I was in a hospital waiting room and saw grace exhibited in an unforgettable manner. The man was huge by anyone's measure - he had the "Alaska look" of beard, long hair, camouflage, snow boots, and standard plaid Costco coat. According to his appearance, he displayed the rugged individualism for which Alaskans are famous. Probably in his middle to late 30s in age, he had come to the hospital for a heart procedure. His wife accompanied him because he needed someone drive him home after the procedure. As we waited, the wife's phone rang. She had not talked long when she began to cry. At the end of the short conversation, the husband asked, "What's wrong?" Her father, who was in ICU in a different hospital, had taken a turn for the worse and was not expected to last much longer. "You have to go see him," the man said. "you might not get another chance." "But what about you?" she asked. "Don't worry about me. I'll be fine. I will make a few calls and someone can come get me." Grace can be demonstrated by the most unlikely people and in the most unlikely circumstances, but we are all in need of it and we can all show it. As Christians, we are recipients of the grace which surpasses every grace-the grace that saves. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God," Ephesians 2:8. As I write this, I am listening to the Collingsworth family sing Shine On Us - "Lord let your grace, grace from your hand, fall on us that we may be saved, that we may have life to find our way in the darkest night, let your grace fall on us."

Bask in the grace of God. Demonstrate grace in every relationship you have, especially in your relationships with those who are lost.

One of the benefits of living in Alaska • is the Permanent Fund Dividend (PFD) we receive every year. Whenever I travel to the Lower 48, people often comment how fortunate I am the State of Alaska pays me to live here. I usually smile and answer, "yes, I am!" I am thankful for the PFD, as there have been years when the money was used to cover medical bills, emergency travel or to pay for a vacation. Rebecca and I have always tithed on our PFDs as we tried to be good stewards of God's blessings.

On September 18, 2013, the Anchorage Daily News reported interesting facts and figures about the 2013 PFD:

- How much was the dividend per person: \$900
- The oldest applicant: 108 years old
- The youngest applicant: one minute old by the deadline of midnight December 31, 2012

- Number of people who applied for the PFD: 670,865
- Number of people who received a PFD: 640.436
- Total amount of PFDs: \$576 mil-• lion
 - Number of people who gave to charity through "Pick, Click and Give": 26,093
 - Total given to charity through "Pick, Click and Give": \$2.4 million
- ٠ Total of individual PFDs since the first one in 1982: \$36,343.41
- Lowest dividend ever: \$331.29 in 1984
- Highest dividend ever: \$2,069 in ٠ 2008

While the PFDs are a blessing, I am even more thankful for the on-going, everyday blessings God provides and I strive to be a faithful steward of that with which God has blessed me. I am careful to not take for granted or misuse His generous gifts.

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If you haven't already begun receiving Social Security Benefits, consider signing up now. Social Security payouts grow by as much as 8% for each year you delay until age 70, but not after.

Age 70 1/2: Tap into your nest egg

Once you're 70 1/2, the IRS requires you to take distributions from your retirement accounts like 403(b) or 401(d) plans if you're retired. (You must take distributions from your IRA at this point, even if you're working.) These mandatory distributions are called required minimum distributions.

Retirement Rundown

9 key retirements ages — and what they mean to you

Age 50: Cash in on catch-ups

Once you're 50, the IRS allows you to make "**catch-up**" **contributions** up to \$5,500 (for 2013) to your 403(b) or 401(k) plan. That means you can defer taxes on up to \$23,000 in contributions annually. Have an IRA, too? You can contribute an extra \$1,000 there as well, up to \$6,500 annually.

Age 55: Withdraw without penalty

If you retire in the year you turn age 55, you can take withdrawals from your 403(b) or 401(k) without having to pay the 10% early withdrawal penalty.



Have an IRA? You can now withdraw any amount without a penalty tax. Roth withdrawals can be taken without taxation of earnings if you've had the account at least 5 years.

Age 62: Get Social Security -- or wait?

You can now draw Social Security, but you might not want to just yet. You'll receive **reduced payments at 62**. The longer you wait to begin your benefits, the larger your payout will be.



Age 65: Welcome to Medicare

You become Medicare eligible. You're required to enroll in certain parts of Medicare, so don't put it off -- if you don't take timely action at 65, you could incur premium penalties. Medicare can be complicated -- be sure to give yourself plenty of time before your 65th birthday to understand your choices. One of the biggest: whether to purchase a Medicare supplement plan to cover costs not covered by Medicare. Hint: You should strongly consider it.

Age 66(ish): Step up to Social Security



Your retirement age, which is determined by your year of birth, determines when you're eligible for full Social Security benefits. It generally falls between 66 and 67 years of age.

Age 67: 1960s babies score full Social Security benefits

Born 1960 or later? You'll be eligible to receive your full Social Security retirement benefits at age 67.
