

Chaplains

Disaster Relief Chaplains are members of Southern Baptist Disaster Relief teams. They are mobilized with their SBC State Convention Disaster Relief team by the State Disaster Relief Coordinator.

As persons called by God, Disaster Relief Chaplains are trained to serve in an environment of disaster relief service and response. There are not many areas of mission service that require greater spiritual sensitivity and more rapid response to human need than a disaster. Therefore, we must be ready to be the "Lord's hands and feet" to hurting humanity, bringing gospel hope to them during crisis.

Disaster Relief Chaplains extend the witness and care of the church into a very specialized time of ministry in the lives of people disrupted unexpectedly by a disaster. For this reason, the training requirements for endorsement as a Disaster Relief Chaplain are set high!

The first step is to complete one unit of training in Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM). For the last several years your Cooperative Program giving has provided training here in Alaska for those who want to serve in this capacity.

Eleven of the most common mistakes made by churches today

was recently in Arkansas speaking with a pastor who is a daily reader of this blog. He expressed gratitude for all the free content, but then he made a kind plea. He said that the blog has so much content that it can be overwhelming at times.

He then asked if I could write some posts that summarized several issues I covered in multiple articles over many months. I asked him to give me an example for clarity. He said, "Maybe you could write an article on the ten most common mistakes made by churches."

His request is proof positive that my readers are much smarter than I am. Why didn't I think of that?

Thank you, pastor. Here is my response with one added to the ten. These are not necessarily the most important issues (I think theological heresy would outrank them all), but they are the most common.

- 1. Failure to have an informative, easy-to-use website. I cringe when I see some churches' websites. That is now the first place a prospective guest visits when he or she is thinking about attending a church. Websites are incredibly affordable today, and they can be updated easily. A church website should be updated at least once a week. It should be one of high quality. And it should contain good and accurate information for guests and members alike.
- 2. Failure of pastors and staff to be actively involved in social media. That is analogous to a missionary in another land failing to learn how to speak the language of the people.
- 3. Failure of pastors and staff to understand they represent the church when they are involved in social media. When I see some of the blog posts and Twitter and Facebook communication of pastors and staff, I am often left speechless. Even if it is a personal blog or Twitter or Facebook account (or almost a dozen other social media entrants), church members read them. The community reads them. Pastors and staff: you represent yourself, your church, and, most importantly, Christ. Please be careful with your words.
- 4. Failure to urge people to be a part of groups. Groups are key to healthy assimilation, ministry involvement, evangelistic intentionality, biblical accountability, and community connections. Church leaders should regularly encourage members and others to get involved in a small group, home group, Sunday school class, or some other ongoing group.
- 5. Failure of leaders to be actively involved in influencing the content of groups. Can you imagine a pastor asking a random person to preach and what that person would say? That's how many leaders treat their groups. Some have no idea what is being taught, studied, and discussed.
- 6. Failure of church members to be considerate of where they sit during a worship service. I can't tell you how many guests told me they had to climb over church members who arrived early and got an aisle seat. I can't tell you how many left no room for others because they used space for their coats, Bibles, smartphones, and other items.
- 7. Failure to have parking lot greeters. This ministry is a church's opportunity to make a first positive impression. However, most churches do not have parking lot greeters.

- 8. Failure to have clearly marked guest parking. Most churches have guest parking places. The problem is most guests can't find them.
- 9. Failure to have clearly marked entrances to the worship center. Ask a person who has never attended your church to do so. Then ask them how difficult it was to find the worship center. Because we know our own church well, we often don't comprehend the challenges a first time guest may have.
- **10. Failure to have clearly marked entrances to the church offices.** This issue is, of course, more of a problem during weekdays.
- **11. Failure to have adequate restroom facilities.** There should be an adequate number of restrooms. They should be clean. And guests should see clearly marked signs that tell them how to find them.

This "top ten plus one" list is not comprehensive. It simply represents the most common mistakes I see.

The Executive Committee passed three board actions while the Board was not in session from November 13, 2013 to May 11, 2014:

- On November 25, 2013, approved funding in the amount of \$2400 to New Beginnings Baptist Church, Seward for 2014. Funds will come from 2014 account 5342 Church Planting Fund.
- On January 14, 2014, approved a change to the Policies and Procedure Manual Part II, Section IX. Financial, A. Insurance, items 1 and 2 to state "term life insurance provided to full-time employees by the Alaska Baptist Convention is limited to 4 times their annual salary and housing. Employees will be given the option to buy more coverage as a deduction of their pay up to the amount limited by GuideStone Financial Services."
- 3. On February 27, 2014, approved funding in the amount of \$9000 for the Upper Tanana Valley Regional Church Planting Center in Tok (\$1,000 per month) starting April 1, 2014. Funds will come from 2014 account 5342 Church Planting Fund.

May 12-13, 2014, Alaska Baptist Convention Executive Board Actions:

Budget and Finance Committee (BFC)

- Approved the April 30, 2014 Financial Report with a journal entry to move \$81.54 from designated account 8920 Designated State Evangelism Conference to budget account 5420 Evangelism Conference.
- Approved creation of the following designated accounts: account 8441 McKay Trust; account 8442 Rollins Trust; account 8443 ABC Education Trust; account 8444 Procter Minister's Spouse Trust; and account 8445 Robert Procter Trust.
- 3. Approved creation of account 5325 Multi-Ethnic Church Planting Training; account 5349 Evangelism Projects; and account 5447 Love Loud Projects. Included in the updated Chart of Accounts described in May 12-13, 2014 Executive Board Action 4 by the BFC is the description of how these funds will be used.
- Approved adoption of the updated Chart of Accounts 4. of the Alaska Baptist Convention for 2015 for the following accounts: account 5325 Multi-Ethnic Church Planter Training funds to be used to assist in providing training and development of multi-ethnic church planters; account 5343 Special Project funds for special multi-ethnic group leadership expenses incurred from special projects for church starts authorized by the director of church planting and missions or executive director; account 5348 Ministers and Spouses Conference funds to be used to plan, promote, and initiate an annual training for all Alaska Baptist Convention ministers and spouses; account 5349 Evangelism Project funds to be used to help church plants engage their communities and campuses with the gospel through events, projects, training, and resources; account 5445 Evangelism Program funds to be used for planning, promoting, and conducting evangelistic training events

and projects; and account 5447 Love Loud Project funds to be used for churches serving their communities through ministry and evangelistic projects.

- Approved the 2015 proposed budget for the Alaska Baptist Convention in the amount of \$1,692,529.00 with projected revenues of \$704,393.00 from the Cooperative Program; \$901,538.00 from the North American Mission Board; \$60,000.00 from LifeWay Christian Resources; \$15,798.00 from designated funds; \$6,000.00 from the Alaska Baptist Foundation; and \$4,800.00 from the Alaska Baptist Foundation Protection Insurance Trust Fund.
- 6. Approved to change the investment allocation of accounts 1225 and 1226 from money market to the balance fund. The motion passed unanimously.
- 7. Approved assignment of the current proposal of ABC equitable salary schedule to the Administration and Personnel Committee to develop a proposed pay based upon salaries for similar jobs in various conventions and return their findings to the BFC.

Administration and Personnel Committee

- 1. Approved the 2014-2015 calendar of the Alaska Baptist Convention.
- 2. Approved adoption of a Reference Release Form as policy of the Alaska Baptist Convention and add it to the Alaska Baptist Convention Policies and Procedures Manual under P&P Manual II, XII. Termination of Service, D. References the following: "No staff member of the Alaska Baptist Convention shall provide a reference or recommendation for a person until there is a signed copy of a Reference Release Form comparable to Appendix 6."

Missions and Church Development Committee

- Approved support in the amount of \$20,000 to In His Steps Community Fellowship for six months (\$3,333.33 per month) starting July 1, 2014. Monies to be used for pastoral assistance and rent to continue outreach and summer ministries. Funding would come from account 5342 Church Planting Fund.
- 2. Approved support in the amount of \$7500 to Kenai Peninsula Church Plant for five months (\$1,500 per month) starting August 1, 2014. Funding would come from account 5342 Church Planting Fund.
- 3. Approved to provide additional funds in the amount of \$4800 to OnMission Church for six months (\$400 per month) starting July 1, 2014. Monies to be used for church growth. Funding would come from account 5342 Church Planting Fund.
- 4. Approved support up to \$12,000 for seven months (\$1714.28 per month) to explore the viability of a church plant in Whitehorse starting June 1, 2014. Funding would come from account 5342 Church Planting Fund, 10 percent viability funds. Funds will be distributed upon presentation of need.
- 5. Approved support in the amount of \$10,500 for a

church plant targeting Wayland Baptist University-Joint Base Elmendorf Richardson area for five months (\$2,100 per month) starting August 1, 2014. Funding would come from account 5342 Church Planting Fund.

- 6. Approved to grant \$2000 to First Baptist Church, Eagle River to involve church members in a mission project, targeting the community around the church. Funding would come from account 8575 Church Strengthening Fund.
- 7. Approved to grant \$3500 to First Baptist Church, Palmer to encourage older children (completed grades 3-6) and their parents to get involved in spiritual growth together during the summer. Funding would come from account 8575 Church Strengthening Fund.

I came home one evening many years ago, and Rebecca commented that she was exhausted because she had to chase after "your sons" all day. At the time, Seth was nearly five years old and Noah was just about two. On that day, I learned two very important lessons: first, I learned the reference to "your sons" meant it had not been a good day; and it was not smart to say "how can you be tired? You have been home all day and I had to go to work." Men! Learn from my mistake. Don't <u>ever</u> say something like that to the mother of your children, especially when she has already told you it's been a hard day!

According to the May/June 2014 issue of *Healthy Liv*ing, the average toddler takes approximately 176 steps a minute which is 10,560 steps an hour! As a general rule, an adult should try to walk 10,000 steps a day but a preschooler would probably laugh in my face about taking only 10,000 steps in a day. I know from practical experience that preschoolers can run circles around me. When our grandchildren were younger and would come to our house, my job was to follow them around while they traveled from room to room exploring, looking and touching everything we had that was within reach. It was not long until I was ready for them to take a nap, watch "Veggie Tales" or even "WWF Smackdown." I did not care – I just wanted them to sit down a minute because I was tired!

In Isaiah 40: 28-31 the Bible says that people who wait on, trust in, depend upon, rely on and have faith in the Lord will get new strength and will be able to run and not get weary, and walk and not become weak. Obviously, these verses apply to spiritual strength and endurance. When we are facing a challenge or a temptation, as we trust in the Lord, He will provide the strength we need. Remember 1 Corinthians 10:13, "You have never been tempted to sin in any different way than other people. **God is faithful.** He will not allow you to be tempted more than you can take. But when you are tempted, **He will** make a way for you to keep from falling into sin" and Galatians 6:9, "Do not let yourselves get tired of doing good. If we do not give up, we will get what is coming to us at the right time."

As we live for the Lord, the enemy will encourage us to take our eyes off the Lord and not trust in His power. Instead of being distracted, let's be sure to keep our eyes on the Lord and trust Him, depend upon Him, rely on Him, have faith in Him and wait on Him so we will not be weary in our faith, so we can become more than conquerors through Him.

Did that catch your attention? Do you have groups in your church? Do your groups matter? How do your groups impact the community around you? Is "groups matter" a true statement of the intent and direction of the groups in your church? Can you identify groups in your church?

As a pastor, Sunday school leader, a small group leader, worship leader, children's teacher or adult team leader, I encourage you to think about this slogan: "groups matter." There are reasons and benefits to being part of a group. In your own church, can you indentify results of groups that have directly contributed to the Great Commission? Do your groups help accomplish the vision of your church? Are your groups healthy? Are they growing? Are they multiplying and forming more groups?

"Groups are absolutely essential to the health and mission of a church. They are likely the starting point for community, discipleship, and service in your church. In fact, recent research shows that people involved in groups are healthier spiritually than those who aren't. People in groups read the Bible more, pray more, give more, and serve more. Simply stated: your groups matter." (*www.groupsmatter.com*)

In your church, how many are involved in groups? Many churches report only half their members are involved in groups. Listen again to the statement, "people involved in groups are healthier spiritually than those who aren't." Could more people in your church be in a group? Yes! Who will start this group and invest in the lives of those people?

I propose a "groups movement." Examine who is not in a group and invite them to join one – they may not be in one because no one has invited them. Pastors, now might be a good time to form a new group. On the website <u>www.</u> <u>groupsmatter.com</u> you will find helpful information on starting new groups and benefits of doing so. What if every church in Alaska started a new group? Let's try it and see how.....

In 1 Cor 16:12-14 Paul told the Corinthians that Apollos was not going to go to Corinth at the present time, but would go when another opportunity presented itself. In Apollos' absence, there were some things that Paul wanted them to know. The men of the Corinthian church were to act like men. He said they ought not to make their hopes of salvation dependent on Apollos or any other teacher. Apparently, they were being negligent in their duties as men, especially as Christian men – they were a little too "laid back." So Paul chided them to wake up and be on their guard. They were also being a little too weak and spineless so Paul instructed them to stand firm and be strong. They were not to just act like men, they were to *actually* be manly. Paul expressed the same idea in 1 Cor 15:58: "Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." And, finally, they were to guit all that caused strife among them and do everything in love.

This is a timely word for us. The next generation requires we be the men of God Paul admonished the Corinthian men to be. In 1985, I worked in the village of Atgasuk erecting telephone poles, stringing wires, and installing transformers in the entire village. I worked with a linesman in his latter working years – he had hung a lot of wires throughout his lifetime. He appreciated the work I did but instead of complimenting me, when he took me to the airport for my flight home, he said, "The next time you see your Dad, tell him he did a great job." I am glad that my Dad got the recognition he deserved for raising me the way he did. I pray that I have been that kind of Dad to my own children. Happy Father's Day. Be strong in the Lord!
