Alaska Baptist Convention welcomes new State Director of Church Planting and Missions

s a college graduate from University of North Alabama, Jae McKee set out on an adventure to the frontier state of Alaska as a US-2 missionary with the Home Mission Board (now North American Mission Board). The year was 1991 and his assignment was southeast Alaska. Little did he know that God would lead him to put down permanent roots in Alaska.

McKee grew up in Rogersville, Alabama in a Christian home and attended church most of his life, but admittedly didn't surrender his life to Christ until his college years. Shortly after graduation, he moved to Juneau, Alaska and began working with Glacier Valley Baptist Church, where he met his future wife, Carole (Estes). After extending his two-year term for a third year, he served as mission pastor at Skagway Baptist Mission. Rather than moving back to Alabama upon completion of his assignment, he moved to Anchorage and in 1994, married Carole, an Alaskan school teacher.

Early in their marriage, Carole accepted a teaching assignment in the village of Aleknagik in southwest Alaska. During their brief stint in the village, Jae became a registered Big Game guide and has maintained his license and been active as a hunting and fishing guide ever since. Their eventual return to Anchorage provided the opportunity to serve in volunteer ministerial positions with two different local Baptist churches. God also blessed them with two children, Jason, 21, a student at University of Alaska-Fairbanks, and Jessica, 19, a student at the University of North Alabama, Jae's alma mater.

In 2003, Jae was called to serve at First Baptist Church of Anchorage. In his thirteen years on staff at FBC, he served as youth minister, outreach director and associate pastor. In January 2017, Jae was invited to serve as (part-time) interim State Director of Church Planting and Missions (SDOM). By unanimous vote of the Executive Board of the Alaska Baptist Convention in May 2018, Jae was invited to serve as full-time SDOM and began his tenure on May 1, 2018.

McKee brings a diverse complement of background and experience to the role in which he has been called. Hav-


ing lived in different parts of the state including Juneau, Skagway, Aleknagik and Anchorage, gives him a unique understanding of village life and city life. Exposure to missions and church planting in various settings allows him to observe methodologies that have been effective as well as some which have not been as effective. As a businessman, he has experience in organi-



zational and financial planning. One thing is evident: He loves the Lord and loves the church and will lead our convention to extend the gospel to every corner of our state and plant churches that will reproduce themselves. When he is not traveling, working, or fishing, he can be found hanging out with his family at his cabin in Talkeetna.

SBC EC names Augie Boto interim president

D. August (Augie) Boto has been named interim president of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee (EC). In Nashville on April 4, the EC officers tapped



Boto for the position following the retirement of former EC President Frank Page, who cited a "personal failing" in announcing his immediate departure. Boto, an attorney, brings more than 20 years of denominational service to this strategic task. In 2007, he was named executive vice president and general counsel of the Executive Committee.

"The EC officers have confidence that Augie will provide stability in leadership for the Executive Committee during this interim period as the EC begins its search for a new president," said EC chairman Stephen Rummage.

Alaska Baptist Disaster Relief Update

Thank you to those who attended the Disaster Relief (DR) training last fall. I assure you our convention is working toward effective disaster preparation. It is a special privilege to work with pastors and churches to prepare to serve Christ and witness through recovery ministries. While we do not hope for a disaster, we need to fully understand the process of organizing and preparing to meet needs in times of crisis.

The next DR training is set for Friday-Saturday, September 14-15, at First Baptist Church, Eagle River. Sabbath Peace Fellowship has graciously volunteered to provide meals during the training. The following classes will be offered:

DR Assessment. Led by Terry Henderson, of Texas Baptist Men, participants will receive instruction on assessing needs following a call-out from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Red Cross or Borough Disaster Management.

<u>Chaplaincy/Spiritual Care Ministry Training</u>. Facilitated by Teresa and Dan Cappel, this training will be offered to those who have received chaplaincy training in the past, but whose credentials must be updated. Newcomers are welcome to attend as well.

Shower and Laundry Ministries Training. Led by Gary Bearce, this particular ministry offers an excellent opportunity for evangelism. The long-range plan will be to procure a portable shower and laundry unit.

For the last several months, I have been active in disaster relief preparation, attending preparedness conferences hosted by the Alaska Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management in cooperation with Alaska Department of Health. I have attended local, statewide and national Volunteers Organized and Active in Disasters (VOAD) meetings, alongside volunteers from the Red Cross, Salvation Army and others. Alaska Baptists would be part of a coordinated team effort should disaster strike.

At this writing, I am in Puerto Rico, working with other volunteers in repairing roofs; at least 50,000 people are still suffering from the aftermath of Hurricane Maria which hit in September, 2017. I also volunteered in Raleigh, North Carolina where residents are recovering from April tornadoes. I was privileged to attend a DR roundtable and training session with 200 others, hosted by the Northwest Baptist Convention, and to learn how our neighbors in Washington and Oregon are organizing their volunteers to be available should disaster strike.

Boto named Jimmy Draper, former president of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC) and president emeritus of LifeWay Christian Resources, as "EC Ambassador." Draper, who has maintained an active speaking schedule

since retiring from LifeWay in 2006, is "someone for whom no introduction or explanation need be given," Boto said in an April 9 announcement. "He is someone whom involved Southern Baptists all across our nation would immediately recognize and trust." In his role as EC



Ambassador, Draper will assist Boto in performing normal presidential duties that would potentially overburden Boto's other responsibilities.

Boto has described Draper and his wife, Carol Ann, as "close friends with my family since the 1970s. He shares my deep love for our convention and its cooperative methodology. I am in debt to his model, his training and his counsel for no small part of that love."



- 1. Approved the Operation Manual presented by Dr. Randy Covington (a copy is filed with the May 7-8, 2018, Board Minutes). Motion passed unanimously.
- 2. Approved to adopt the 2019 proposed Alaska Baptist Convention calendar of events to be published in the 2018 Book of Reports (a copy is filed with the May 7-8, 2018, Board Minutes). Motion passed unanimously.
- 3. Approved modifying the Policies and Procedures Manual to bring it into better alignment with current practice (a copy of the specific changes is filed with the May 7-8, 2018, Board Minutes).
- 4. Approved the March 2018 Financial Reports (a copy is filed with the May 7-8, 2018, Board Minutes). Motion passed unanimously.
- 5. A City of Great Diversity

nchorage, Alaska is a city of great ethnic diversity. University of Alaska Anchorage sociology professor Chad Farrell commented, "There are few areas in the United States that have the mix of groups and the presence of groups in significant sizes like we do." Farrell said the city ranks thirtieth among 366 met-

ropolitan areas in the diversity index and is fifth among medium-sized U.S. cities. He adds this diversity is more evident in public school populations. The top three most-diverse high schools, the top three most-diverse middle schools and the top 19 most-diverse elementary schools in the United States are in Anchorage, Alaska.

The question facing the churches of Anchorage is one that requires an honest evaluation; What will we do to match the ethnic diversity of our city? According

to Ed Stetzer, "Any church that will be bold and audacious enough to tackle diversity – and overcome their homogenous tendency – will need to teach, model and implement these five truths of diversity." In his article he goes on to delineate the five truths: diversity is biblical, sacrificial, humble, intentional and beneficial. "In living out these five truths of diversity, our churches will reflect more of the eschatological kingdom of God in the here and now."

Sunset Hills took the challenge and is working towards a diversity that reflects our city. One can find Koreans, African Americans, Filipinos, Vietnamese, Latinos and Alaska Natives at Sunset Hills. The current ethnic make-up of the church is

about 25 percent minority and 75 percent Anglo. The roots of diversity began over 25 years ago when the church began a ministry to internationals. The English and Citizenship School opened the door to a more diverse body. Additionally, it has been the desire of the church to see a Spanish speaking Southern Baptist congregation in Anchorage. Currently the church

is in its second effort to see this dream become a reality.

As an established church we have the benefit of a facility which affords us the opportunity to share our space with the Spanish language church plant. As stewards of the Lord's resources it is our aspiration and responsibility to use the building to the greatest extent possible. The high cost of real estate in Anchorage makes it prohibitive for a new work to purchase a facility to meet their needs. Therefore we

must look to sharing facilities with these new works. Economics in Anchorage presents this second challenge, sharing facilities, to the established churches as we work together to reach our city for the kingdom of God. Developing strategies and plans to share our buildings should be a priority.

These two issues, diversity and economics, are just as much a new frontier to be conquered by the church in Anchorage to-day as was clearing land and hauling in a Quonset hut decades ago. Just as in days gone by, we too must possess a cooperative spirit and unity of purpose, as we approach these two issues, so we can bring honor to the Lord.
