

MINUTES OF THE 73RD ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ALASKAWOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION WMU Annual Meeting

Alaska Baptist Convention/Alaska Baptist Resource Network (ABC/ABRN)

77th Annual Meeting Minutes September 27-28, 2022

Session 1

President Tom Hoffman called the 77th Annual Meeting of the ABC/AB RN to order on September 27, 2022, at 1:45 p.m. The meeting was held at Glacier Valley Baptist Church, Juneau, Alaska. (File 1, Count 00:02:05)

Trenton Cooper, Transitional Pastor of Glacier Valley Baptist Church, welcomed the messengers and guests and read from Hebrews 4:14. (File 1, Count 00:02:45)

Shirley Bearce, Chair of the Credentials Committee, presented the committee's report that as of 1:53 p.m. there were 82 messengers physically present, 5 messengers online, and 2 guests registered. There were 31 ABC/ABRN churches represented. The total number of registered, including guests, was 89. The total number of voting members registered was 87. On behalf of the Credentials Committee, Mrs. Bearce moved that the roll of in-person and online messengers and those who sign in after them be seated for the 77th Annual Meeting of the ABC/ABRN. The motion passed without objection and a quorum established. (File 1, Count 00:06:50)

Jody Winquist, Recording Secretary of ABC/ABRN, on behalf of the Program Committee moved to adopt the program of the 77th Annual Meeting as printed that was handed out to each registrant of the convention along with any adjustments that may be required. The program was adopted as printed without objection. (File 1, Count 00:07:54)

Dr. Randy Covington, the Executive Director/Treasurer of the ABC/ABRN, presented his report. The theme of this year's Annual Meeting was "Rooted in Christ" based on Colossians 2:6-7. Dr. Covington shared that Glacier Valley Baptist Church is in the process of church revitalization through the support of the ABC/ABRN, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Revitalization Department, and Pineville Baptist Church in Louisiana. He reported that last year Liberty Church (formerly called Anchor Baptist Church) in Craig, Alaska went through the revitalization process supported by the ABRN and Alabama. The church attendance in Craig went from 7 people to over 80 people. Cold Bay Chapel has been in the revitalization process for three years and went from 4 people in attendance to over 30. This year the Korean church, Antioch Baptist Church, Boston, gave ABC/ABRN \$100,000 for church revitalization. In March 2023, Richard Blackaby and Mark Clifton (church revitalization representative from NAMB) will conduct a Revitalization Summit in Anchorage and Fairbanks. The Alabama Partnership is going well. Several work teams came to Alaska this summer and many more teams are committed to come next year. As a result of the Sexual Abuse Task Force report during the SBC Annual Meeting in Anaheim, CA, the ABC/ABRN has established the following protocol for reporting sexual abuse: 1. Report to the local law enforcement; 2. Report to the ABC/ABRN executive director; and 3. Sarah Cambridge, licensed counselor at Birchwood Behavioral Health, will provide counseling for victims. Of the 111 affiliated ABC/ABRN churches, 37 churches (or over 1/3 of affiliated churches) are not contributing to the Cooperative Program. As of August 30, 2022, ABC/ABRN was 19 percent under budget in CP giving or a little more than \$93,000.00. CP giving is for missions. 2025 will be the centennial start of the CP. Dr. Covington would like to challenge churches to increase their CP giving by 10% each year for the next three years. The ABC/ABRN and North American Mission Board

(NAMB) relationship has improved over the past year. NAMB has agreed to work with ABC/ABRN on the following three strategic initiatives:

- 1. To engage Gen-Send student volunteers to assist Alaska churches during the summer season of ministry;
- 2. To expand replant/revitalization efforts in Alaska in cooperation with Mark Clifton (NAMB representative) and the NAMB replant team; and
- 3. To assist the church planting through local residency programs.

New pastors to Alaska since the 2021 Annual Meeting were Trenton Cooper (Revitalization Pastor for Glacier Valley Baptist Church, Juneau) and Rendell Day (Pastor for Montana Creek Baptist Church). New Staff at the ACB/ABRN office is Donna Fleury (member of First Native Baptist Church, Anchorage) serving as Administrative Assistant to the Director of Evangelism/Church Development. Alaska servants of the Lord who have gone to glory this year were: Ruth Meeks (deceased in February 2022), Jimmy Woods (deceased in May 2022), J. D. Back (deceased in May 2022), Butch Strickland (deceased in August 2022), Mary Newton (deceased in September 2022), and Lance Davis (deceased in September 2022). The assessor's 2020-2021 Financial Assessment of the ABC/ABRN is located on pages 27-44 of the 2022 Book of Reports. Eric Jones, messenger and Pastor of New Birth Christian Church, made a motion to accept the assessor's report as printed in the 2022 Book of Reports. Philip Coleman, messenger and pastor of True North, Anchorage, seconded the motion. The motion passed without opposition. Dr. Covington's written report is located on page 13 of the 2022 Book of Reports. (File 1, Count 00:09: 13)

Jimmy Stewart, Director of Evangelism and Church Development of the ABC/ABRN, reported that 16 affiliated churches and two organizations (Mosaic Campus Ministries and LaVerne Griffin Camp) requested evangelism funds, and 11 affiliated churches requested Vacation Bible School Funds this year. 65% of the \$100,000.00 given by NAMB for evangelism efforts have been used for evangelism projects. Over 2,000 people attended these evangelism events, and around 60 salvations were reported. There were seven salvations reported from Vacation Bible Schools conducted by affiliated churches throughout the state. Outreach teams assisted First Baptist Church, Petersburg with Vacation Bible School, three youth rallies, and 115 people attended the block party that FBC, Petersburg hosted. David Gamble led the Saturday Market evangelism event of First Baptist Church, Anchorage. There were twelve salvations reported from the Saturday Market event. Mr. Stewart's written report is located on page 16 of the 2022 Book of Reports. (File 1, Count 00:32:08)

Jae McKee, Director of Missions and Church Planting, stated the goal for the 2000 Club is to receive \$20,000 per quarter in contributions for church capital improvement needs. If 2000 people would commit to giving \$10 per quarter, the goal would be met. As of December 2021, the average receipt was \$3,725 per quarter. Last year's Valeria Sherard State Mission Offering goal was \$75,000. Offerings received were approximately \$13,000 short of the goal. This year's goal remains the same. Last year NAMB funds were a little over \$341,000. Mr. McKee read Psalm 27 in closing. His written report is located on pages 14-15 of the 2022 Book of Reports. (File 1, Count 00:50:02)

Marilyn King, member of the Budget and Finance Committee of the ABC/ABRN Executive Board, presented the ABC/ABRN 2023 Proposed Budget that was distributed to messengers during registration and located on pages 72-74 of the 2022 Book of Reports. The 2023 budget amount will be \$895,271. There was no discussion. The budget passed as printed without opposition. (File 1, Count 00:58:20:)

President Hoffman called for a 15-minute break.

President Hoffman resumed the meeting by having Dr. Covington introduce the president and editor-in-chief of the Alabama Baptist Paper, Jennifer Rash.

Sarah Cambridge, the Executive Director/Treasurer of Birchwood Behavioral Health, reported that around 20 years ago the Alaska Baptist Family Services (dba Birchwood Behavioral Health) no longer was supported solely by churches and became state funded. Currently, around 98 percent of BBH funding comes from Medicaid and 2 percent from Alaska Baptists. Because of Medicaid funding, BBH clinicians cannot talk about religion or the salvation message of Christ to their clients. BBH cottages can hold 24 residents, but currently due to lack of funding and low staffing, BBH houses 6 clients. There are 23 Children's Homes in the Baptist Children's Homes for Families (BCHF) in the United States, and BBH is the only one governmentally funded. Mrs. Cambridge reported that Alaska's suicide rate is the highest in the nation and petitioned churches to volunteer time to interact with BBH clients in Bible studies and other evangelism activities. BBH needs to have a full roof replacement that will cost approximately \$200,000. (File 2, Count 00:01:11)

Dr. Randy Covington introduced Adam Long, ABF Foundation Coordination Director, who presented the ABF report. For the year 2022, ABF earnings available for distribution totaled \$157,496.10. Just over \$66,383 went to Alaska Baptist missions; \$10,605 to Native Camp; \$33,797 to scholarships; and \$46,709 to the ABC/ABRN. The world is now suffering from a decline in the market. Mr. Long shared that the availability of physical resource, such as money, is often directed by the spiritual condition of one's heart. Because money is just a physical resource the discretionary priorities of its use are often a reflection of one's spiritual condition. If we are established and rooted in the faith of Jesus Christ, then it is important to demonstrate His characteristics. The characteristics of Christ as one who is the perfect example and embodiment of: cornerstone, humility, righteousness, inspiration, service, and truth. The ABF 2020-2021 assessor's report is located on pages 49-60 of the 2022 Book of Reports. Eric Jones, messenger and pastor of New Birth Christian Church, made a motion to receive the ABF 2020-2021 Assessor's Report. Bobby King, messenger for First Baptist Church, Wasilla, seconded the motion and the motion passed without objection.

The written reports of ABF executive director, coordination director, and president are located on page 18 of the 2022 Book of Reports. (File 2, Count 00:31:53)

Dr. Angela Jones, President of the Alaska WMU, presented her report from the Alaska WMU. The 2023 WMU theme "Hope in Christ" comes from the scripture passage, Romans 12:9-16. One-half of the offerings collected from the 2022 Annual WMU Meeting and offerings from the 2023 Women on Missions Celebration will go to BBH and one-half to the WMU Touch Tomorrow Today Foundation. Dr. Jones's written report is located on page 20 of the 2022 Book of Reports. (File 2, Count 00:44:25)

Gary Bearce, Director of Alaska Baptist Disaster Relief, distributed a written copy of his report. The theme of Alaska Disaster Relief

is "to carry one another's burden, and in this way, you fulfill the law of Christ" from Galatians 6:2. Over 10,000 disaster relief volunteers throughout the nation will assist in the Florida hurricane clean-up efforts. The Alaska Baptist Disaster Relief serves the churches with training to assist their community when a disaster happens. (File 2, Count 01:03:13)

Shannon Midkiff, Chair of the Annual Committees (Committee on Boards; Committee on Committees; and Time, Place, and Preacher Committee), presented the Annual Committees' report that is located on page 77 of the 2022 Book of Reports and the biographic of all nominees is on page 76. One addition was made to the printed report and that was to elect Tracy Simmons, pastor for Christ Community Church, Anchorage, to replace the 2024 term of Guy Mickel. All recommendations from the 2022 Annual Committee passed without opposition. (File 2, Count 01:13:19)

President Hoffman called for miscellaneous business. Mike Procter, pastor and messenger for Transitional Ministries, made the following motion: "In response to previous motions I have made regarding the relationship between the Alaska Baptist Resource Network and North American Mission Board, I make what I hope to be my final motion on this topic. It is clear that our President Tom Hoffman and Executive Director Randy Covington met with President Kevin Ezell and Vice President Rick Curtis in January 2022 to dialogue about ways to build cooperation between the two entities. The results of this dialogue were reported to the Executive Board at the session conducted May 2-3, 2022, which identified three strategic initiatives that could be pursued mutually. They are: (1) To engage Gen-Send student volunteers to assist Alaska churches during the summer season of ministry; (2) To expand Replant/ Revitalization efforts in Alaska in cooperation with Mark Clifton and the NAMB Replant team; and (3) To assist in church planting through local residency programs. Therefore, I make a motion that we pursue these strategic initiatives and pray that God blesses the results of these efforts in reaching our state for Jesus Christ." Jody Winquist, messenger for First Baptist Church, Anchorage, seconded the motion. After discussion, the motion passed by a majority vote with three in opposition. (File 2, Count 01:17:50)

President Hoffman called for the General Good and Welfare of the Convention reports. Nathaniel Buck, pastor and messenger of Agape Fellowship in Wasilla, reported that since Roe versus Wade was overturned in June 2022 by the Supreme Court churches are asking "What next?". Mr. Buck submitted a resolution on abortion to be considered by the Resolution Committee for presentation at the 2023 Annual Meeting. (File 2, Count 01:29:55) Rob Scott, pastor and messenger of Dillingham Bible Church, formally recommended the Constitution and Bylaws Committee consider adopting the "2000 Baptist Faith and Message" statement of faith in the ABC/ABRN Bylaws. (File 2, Count 01:37:30)

President Hoffman relinquished the floor to Dr. Covington to call for nominations of officers. Alan McElroy, pastor and messenger for White Cliff Church, Ketchikan, nominated Rob Scott, pastor of Dillingham Bible Church, as president. Bobby King, messenger for First Baptist Church, Wasilla, nominated David Bradley, pastor of First Baptist Church, Valdez, as president. (File 2, Count 01:45:40)

Dr. Covington called for nominations for Vice Presidents. The custom of the ABC/ABRN is that the person receiving the most votes will become First Vice President and the person receiving the second most votes will become Second Vice President. Therefore, two nominees are required. Tracy Simmons, pastor and messen-

ger for Christ Community Church, Anchorage, nominated Philip Coleman, pastor of True North Church, Anchorage. Talakai Finau, pastor of Mount Redoubt Baptist Church, Kenai, nominated Willie Tauanuu, pastor of University Baptist Church, Anchorage. (File 2, Count 01:49:05)

Dr. Covington called for nominations for Recording Secretary. There were no nominations from the floor. Cathy Arns, messenger for First Baptist Church, Anchorage, volunteered to serve as Recording Secretary. Gary Bearce made a motion to cease nominations. Dr. Covington closed the nominations of officers. (File 2, Count 01:52:47)

Dr. Covington turned the floor back over to President Hoffman who closed the first session of the annual meeting at 4:55 p.m. Bruce Rowell, pastor of First Baptist Church, Palmer, led the benediction prayer. The meeting will reconvene at 6:15 p.m.

Session 2

The meeting was called back to order by First Vice-President Robert Scott at 6:17 p.m., Tuesday, September 27, 2022. (File 3, Count 00:00:10)

The California Baptist University Praise Team (Aaron Carrillo, Timothy Craig, Daniel Espinosa, and Noah Fickel) led worship through music for sessions 2 and 3 of the 2022 Annual Meeting.

Talakai Finau, the pastor of Mount Redoubt, Kenai, provided scripture reading and singing. (File 3, Count 00:07:07)

Mrs. Bearce gave an updated list of registered messengers from the Credentials Committee. As of 6: 15 p.m., Tuesday, September 27, 2022, there were 85 physically registered messengers, I 5 online messengers, and 15 guests. The total registered attendance, including guests, was 115. The total number of voting messengers was I 00 representing 33 Alaska Baptist churches. (File 3, Count 00:22:40)

Reports



Recently, I received a reminder on my Facebook page of a previous mountain-climbing experience in Greece. It took me back eight years when a group of IMB colleagues joined me for an ascent of Mount Olympus near Thessaloniki. As precious memories flooded my mind, I stared at a picture of friendly faces full of smiles at one of the hydrating stops along the way. Feeling the compulsion to write these dear friends and reminisce a bit, they reminded me of the utter exhaustion at

that moment on the mountain and the contrived smiles for the

photo. If there had been audio proof of this moment, the conversation would have included questions about whether we would make it to the summit or not. We were weary!

The theme for this year's meeting is **UNWAVERING!** We have been called to a monumental task of taking the gospel of Jesus Christ to every corner of our state. There are moments when we put a smile on our faces in the midst of our weariness and press on because we know this is a sacred calling that has eternal consequences. We must take breaks along the way to renew our minds and spirits, but we must never give up on our calling. Galatians 6:9 says, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

Here are some ways that we are unwavering in our commitment to carry the gospel to the ends of the earth:

Revitalization - This effort continues to be at the forefront of our focus on developing healthy churches that have grown weary through the years in fulfilling the task of the Great Commission. We have already seen some excellent movement in this area. Assistance has come from faithful partners from outside Alaska including Alabama, Louisiana, South Carolina, Texas, and from NAMB Replant. Mark Clifton and his team of consultants have offered training and encouragement through the Revive Conferences conducted this past year. I am excited to say that Alaska churches with resources provided by the ABRN have come alongside local congregations to help them find a path to health and vitality to be positioned for long-term Kingdom impact. The glue for making this happen is the cooperative spirit that has long characterized Alaska Baptists. The Department for Doing Good, LLC will be joining us in this strategic initiative of revitalization over the next two years. We must not grow weary in strengthening the work through all our network churches.

Birchwood Behavioral Health – Last year, Sarah Cambridge made a plea to Alaska Baptists at the annual meeting in Juneau to pray about and assist with the immediate need related to older facilities at the campus located on O'Malley Rd. Before the meeting concluded, pastors as well as messengers from our churches, came forward to offer resources and volunteer their time to meet this crucial need. Alaska Baptists did not wait for someone else to step into this gap but chose to fill it themselves. The ministry of Alaska Baptist

Family Services has been a part of our local ministry for 67 years. We have benefitted from resources within our Southern Baptist network who have also provided a constant flow of skilled laborers and encouragers who have come to Alaska to lend a helping hand in this effort. You will see pictures and hear glowing reports from those who have joined hands with us in fulfilling this task. Many of the young residents of the BBH program have been impacted by these volunteers and local churches. We have seen several of these youth profess Christ as Lord and Savior and receive baptism through the ministry of Rabbit Creek Church. Thank you, Alaska Baptists for not giving up on the work of serving teens and pre-teens along with their families during times of crisis.

Capitol Ministries - The ABRN entered a partnership with Capitol Ministries (CapMin) in 2019 to establish Bible studies with legislative leaders in our state. Just as we were gaining momentum in this new field of outreach, the Covid pandemic hit and plans were placed on hold for a few years. Dr. Ralph Drollinger, the founder of Capitol Ministries, has been a great asset in building a relationship with Governor Mike Dunleavy, which led to an open invitation to conduct weekly Bible studies at the state capitol in Juneau. We began this outreach in January at the beginning of the Alaska legislative session. Upon securing start-up funds from CapMin, I began traveling weekly to lead Bible studies which have drawn participants from the House of Representatives and the Senate. Participants have included legislators from all parties along with legislative aids and directors within the Department of Health. Our standing rules are clear; we check our politics and denominational affiliations at the door and seek Christian fellowship, Bible study, and intercessory prayer for each other, our state leaders, and our state. I am excited to be a part of such a vital ministry and anticipate that God will bless the proclamation of His Word in the political arena.

Engaging Russians and Ukrainians – Another new avenue of outreach for the ABRN is among Russian-speaking refugees who have been coming to our state in droves. The displacement of Ukrainians as a result of the conflict initiated by the Russian government, has brought Ukrainian refugees as well as Russian dissidents to Alaska. With the assistance of churches in the Hatcher Pass Baptist Association, Anchorage and the Kenai peninsula, a work is now beginning in southcentral Alaska. Slava was born in Ukraine but moved to Russia as a young lad along with his family. He served for many years as a pastor in Russia but was recently forced to leave his homeland and seek refuge in another part of the world. He brought with him a wife and adult son along with a burning desire to serve the Lord in planting churches among Russian-speaking people in Alaska. A fellowship has begun on Sunday evenings in south Anchorage which will include Bible study and outreach to a largely unengaged population segment within our state. Efforts are already in place to catalyze new work in Wasilla and the Kenai/Soldotna community. Alaska Baptists have the privilege of supporting and encouraging the work of this family as they adapt to a new culture and language. I am thankful to Rabbit Creek-Huffman for offering the use of their campus facilities to host this new work.

Partnerships – On the heels of a flurry of summer activities, we have seen a steady flow of volunteers from our partners outside the state. Alabama continues to reach new heights of engagement through the coordination of Scotty Goldman, Alabama state missions director along with several Associational Mission Strategists

(AMS) from Alabama. These leaders are mobilizing more and more teams and recruiting more churches to join us in Kingdom work across our state. Volunteers have also come from North and South Carolina, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, and Texas involved in a variety of ministries. We are so thankful for the broader family of Southern Baptists who cooperate for the sake of the gospel, even here in Alaska.

Cooperative Program (CP) – This funding mechanism has been described as the glue that holds Southern Baptists together in a global missions thrust that is second to none. The CP was initiated in 1925 by messengers to the Southern Baptist Convention and has supported the sending and supporting of thousands of missionaries across the globe for 98 years. Alaska Baptists have participated in that cooperative effort for 77 of those years. The impetus for church planting and missional engagement throughout Alaska has been driven by the sacrificial giving of churches in Alaska through the CP. Recent trends have seen a steady decline in giving across the state. Some churches have not contributed in months or years. Let's not grow weary in doing good for the fields are white unto harvest. Unwavering!



It is difficult to believe that summer is over, and we are now headed into another fall in Alaska!

2023 has been filled with God's activity throughout our state as He calls and brings people to Himself. Many stories of transformation and deliverance have been told this year already and we continue to celebrate our Creator and King as His Spirit stirs among us.

It is a blessing to serve alongside you here in Alaska as we work

This past year Alaska Baptist churches and missions reported 194 baptisms. Look at section VII, Historical and Statistical Reports to see how well your church, mission, or association did in 2021-2022. There were five more baptisms reported from the year before. The number of total members was reported as 9867, a decrease of 992 from 10,859 reported the year before. The number in Sunday worship average attendance was 3895, which is down from 3995 the previous year. But, there was a reported 708 in attendance online at our churches. Average Bible Study attendance was recorded as 2554, up from 2418 the previous year. Our numbers are recovering from the pandemic and we expect to see those numbers rise in the coming years. We need to continue reaching, teaching and keeping new members and making a diligent effort to reach out to believers who have not returned to our churches.

I would hope that every church is tracking attendance, baptism and other important indicators of God's working. One way to do this is through the Annual Church Profile or the ACP. It is important for our churches to report their stats on the Annual Church Profile. It helps you gauge how you are doing as a church; it has greater implications that involve funding for state and associational work if you post the report, and it is through the ACP that national and state determine your allotted number of messengers to the annual meetings. Please make every effort to report your statistics. If you have questions, call Debra Long in our office.

If you want to explore possibilities for your church in the area of evangelistic outreach and church development, contact me. I will be glad to help your church develop training, events and infrastructure to enhance your ministry efforts. There are simple things churches can do to increase the evangelistic effectiveness of events. I would love to help your church learn more. It would be exciting to see every church that didn't record a baptism to have just one person stir the baptismal water. One of the best ways to see increases in evangelism is to make someone responsible for this in your church. They could be working with every ministry group to help with evangelism efforts. I would be glad to train and resource anyone seeking to help your church with evangelism. Our national SBC emphasis is "Who's Your One." Every church was sent a kit to help with this emphasis. I suggest that you run this emphasis not as a year-long goal but do it in short spurts or leading up to an event. This could be done several times through the year and done for several years in a row.

The State Evangelism Conference is always an exciting and encouraging event. At the time of writing this report, we are planning for 2024. I will report our plans and dates at the annual meeting.

Vacation Bible School is a big emphasis in our churches. There were 2129 total registered in clubs throughout the state in 2022. This reflects a 343 increase in attendance over the previous year. Our VBS clinics will be held in April this coming year. Plan now to bring your leadership team to the clinic near you.

STAFF REPORTS

Starting small groups or another Sunday morning class is an almost certain way to increase attendance. Teaching the Bible and developing community among believers is an important part of the ministry in a local church. What classes or small groups need to be started this year? What help or training do you need? We are here to assist you.

Throughout the year the convention will help churches that request

A Word from the Foundation Coordination Director:

2022-23 has been an interesting year in many ways. Coming off one of the worst combined fixed income and equity markets, prospects going into 2023 were low. Many were expecting a recession. Surprisingly, for the most part the equity markets continue to maintain against the backdrop of higher interest rates and stub-

bornly persistent inflation. Some economists still believe a recession is inevitable given the state of our national monetary and fiscal

policy practices. Timing of these events is always difficult; however, most suggest sometime in 2024. On the plus side increasing interest rates through the Federal Reserve have produced attractive Certificate of Deposit (CD) options. The ABF has been able to offer several member churches and the Alaska Baptist Resource Network (ABRN) some good return at very low risk.

We also continue to encourage and promote Christian estate planning. Please take a look at our leaving a legacy page at https://abf.foundation/page/leaving-a-legacy we have a video presentation called "Is God's Will in Your Will" accessible through this page that outlines the biblical basis of stewardship and practical examples of ways to leave a lasting Christian legacy.

At the writing of this report, ABF has a total of 69 funds for which it acts in a fiduciary capacity -- these include various trusts and Memorial funds, agency managed funds, gift annuities and Unitrust. The total of the fund balances as of **June 30**, 2023, is \$8,698,319.49

We appreciate your continued prayers and support as we work together to strengthen, educate and encourage new and upcoming WMU organizations in our churches. Thank you and may God's blessings continue to flow upon you and the work you do in Christ's name.

This has been an incredible year in the life of this body of believers. The ministry of Faith Recovery Fellowship (FRF) started in 2015 as a prison and chaplaincy ministry inside Alaska institutions. Through the early years it involved teaching, discipleship and preaching inside the walls of prison. Praise the Lord, He opened the door for FRF to grow outside the walls of prison to minister to men and women who had served their time and reentered society.

In the last four years the ministry has outgrown our current facility.

Even though we are not a large body our poten-

tial to grow is limited by lack of space. We ask you to pray with us for the ability to continue to grow by acquiring a larger facility.

The Prison ministry is doing well. The work is continuing to grow with programs five evenings a week and Sunday Services. There have been men coming out of prison and attending FRF as their church home. Several chaplains are connected to FRF, serving in three institutions in Palmer, Eagle River, and Anchorage. Our connection to Prison Fellowship (PF) has been fruitful as we partner with them in a reentry program. Through our connection with Audio Scripture Ministry, we have provided 140 Audio Bibles to inmates in two prisons with more expected.

Over the past year churches from the Lower 48 have shown interest in partnering with FRF in ministry. This is encouraging, as we look forward to growing into a larger facility. We anticipate continued cooperation and growing relationships in the future.

We are excited about the direction God is leading us as a church. In June we started a radio broadcast on three different stations in Alaska and one internet station. The program is called "Faith Renewed". The content of the program is messages of sermons preached at FRF Saturday Night. These messages are edited and distributed to the stations through the ministry of Al Mathews of Halmatt Productions.

Many thanks to all who pray for this ministry.

Wainwright and Eielson AFB, thus providing the critical role in keeping Wayland-Alaska's Fairbanks and Anchorage locations connected. NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The Alaska Baptist Convention (Convention) is a nonprofit corporation with the purpose of glorifying God by assisting churches to evangelize the lost, equip new believers, establish new churches, encourage the saints and extend the Gospel to the ends of the earth. In its continued efforts to complete this mission, the Convention works with associations located throughout the state of Alaska, as well as the Southern Baptist Convention, and the North American Mission Board.

The primary source of funding for the Convention is Cooperative Program revenue. The Cooperative Program is a financial channel of cooperation between the state conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention which makes it possible for all persons making undesignated gifts through their church to support the missionary, education, and benevolent work in their state convention and also the work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Convention serves as the collecting agent of Cooperative Program receipts and Valeria Sherard State Missions Offering. These receipts are then distributed according to the annual budget and the Convention Policies and Procedures. Other special offerings and designated receipts are distributed according to the desires of the contributors.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Convention have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Convention considers all instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents consist of money market securities stated at fair value which approximates cost. Cash and cash equivalents are maintained at financial institutions, and at times balances may exceed federally insured limits. These amounts represent actual account balances held by financial institutions at the end of the period, and unlike the balances reported in the financial statements, the account balances do not reflect timing delays inherent in reconciling items such as outstanding checks and deposits in transit. The Convention has never experienced any losses related to these balances.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Continued

Receivables

The Convention reports receivables at net realizable value. Management determines the allowance for doubtful accounts based on historical losses and current economic conditions. On a continuing basis, management analyzes delinquent receivables and, once these receivables are determined to be uncollectible, they are written off through a charge against an existing allowance or against earnings. Based on management's review, no allowance for doubtful accounts was considered necessary at December 31, 2022 or 2021.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are carried at cost or, if donated, the approximate fair value at the date of donation, less accumulated depreciation and include expenditures which substantially increase the useful lives of existing property and equipment. Maintenance, repairs and minor renovations are charged to income as incurred. When property and equipment are retired or otherwise disposed of, the related costs and accumulated depreciation are removed from the respective accounts and any gain or loss on the disposition is credited or charged to income. The Convention provides for depreciation of property and equipment using the straight-line method designed to amortize costs over the following estimated useful lives: buildings and improvements, 7 to 39 years; furniture and fixtures, 5 to 7 years; and automobiles, 5 years.

Investments

Investments in debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are recorded at fair market value. Investments without readily determinable fair values are recorded at cost, or if impaired, at estimated realizable value. The Convention's investments consist primarily of funds invested in money market and funds invested by the Alaska Baptist Foundation (the Foundation) through The Baptist Foundation of Alabama (TBFA).

Income Taxes

The Convention is a nonprofit corporation and has been granted tax-exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes.

NOTE 4 - RETIREMENT PLANS

The Convention makes contributions for its employees to a defined contribution retirement plan maintained by GuideStone Financial Resources, an entity affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention. The Convention makes non-matching contributions to employee accounts equal to 10% of the employee's salary. The Convention matches employee contributions, up to 5% of the employee's salary. Employees are eligible for participation after one full year of employment and are fully vested at the time eligibility for participation is met. Contributions to the plan totaled \$57,038 and \$52,412 for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Convention is affiliated with the Foundation and provides administrative support. The Convention provided \$1,200 and \$1,200 in administrative support to the Foundation during the year ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 respectively. The Foundation also administers certain assets for the Convention, whose value totaled \$1,314,794 and \$1,377,501 at December 31, 2022 and 2021 respectively and is included in investments. The Convention receives \$7,200 per year for office rental from the Foundation.

NOTE 6 - FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

The financial statements contain certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include salaries and employee benefits. Management determined based on the nature of the Convention's operations and organizational structure, that the principal drivers of expenses is time spent by employees in the related program or support area and is used as the basis for allocating these expenses.

NOTE 9 – THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF ALABAMA

For Convention investments held with the Foundation, it is recommended that the Executive Board review TBFA audited financial statements, as well as any policy and procedure documents deemed relevant.

The audited financial statements for TBFA contain disclosures regarding the treatment of investment instruments, fair value accounting of investment instruments and various other accounting principles used by TBFA. The disclosures contained within the aforementioned financial statements are relevant to the Convention due to the amount of investment instruments placed with the Foundation that are managed by TBFA. However, these disclosures are outside the scope of the preparation engagement and not included in the notes to these financial statements.

The members of Ogburn and White, LLC are full time employees of TBFA.

NOTE 10 - PPP LOAN

On April 27, 2020, the Convention received loan proceeds in the amount of \$95,800 under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP"). The PPP, established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"), provides for loans to qualifying business for amount up to 2.5 time the average monthly payroll expenses of the qualifying business. The Loan may be prepaid by the Borrower at any time prior to maturity with no prepayment penalties. Funds from the Loan may only be used for payroll costs, costs used to continue group health care benefits, mortgage payments, rent, utilities, and interest on other debt obligations incurred before October 12, 2020. The Convention used the entire Loan amount for qualifying expenses. Under the terms of the PPP, certain amounts of the Loan may be forgiven if they are used for qualifying expenses as described in the CARES Act.

On January 22, 2021, the Convention received a written Notice of Paycheck Protection Program Forgiveness Payment from the Small Business Administration. The loan was forgiven in full and is presented as a component of income on the statement of activities.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The Baptist Foundation of Alaska (the Foundation) is a not-for-profit corporation organized for the purposes of raising, investing, and managing endowment funds in order to provide income for the support of the Alaska Baptist Convention (the Convention) and Southern Baptist Convention agencies, institutions, and causes. The Foundation works with associations and donors located throughout the State of Alaska as well as The Baptist Foundation of Alabama (TBFA).

TBFA holds approximately 98% of the Foundation's investment instruments and engages an independent audit firm to conduct an annual financial statement audit. An unqualified opinion was issued by Barfield, Murphy, Shank, and Smith, LLC for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers all instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents consist of money market securities stated at fair value which approximates cost. Cash and cash equivalents are maintained at financial institutions and, at times, balances may exceed federally insured limits. These amounts represent actual account balances held by financial institutions at the end of the period, and unlike the balances reported in the financial statements, the account balances do not reflect timing delays inherent in reconciling items such as outstanding checks and deposits in transit. The Foundation has never experienced any losses related to these balances.

Investments

Investments in debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are recorded at fair market value. Investments without readily determinable fair values are recorded at cost, or if impaired, at estimated realizable value. The Foundation's investments consist primarily of funds invested in fixed-income and equity securities and hedge funds.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2022 and 2021 (continued)

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Investments (continued)

The Foundation's investments are converted to units of common funds administered by TBFA. These common funds include the assets of charitable trusts and other specified types of assets authorized by law to be jointly invested, as well as general endowment funds. Investments held for others include obligations consisting of units of these common funds, as well as other specifically identified assets. These assets are segregated from general assets of the Foundation. The units of common funds included in the Foundation's investments are reported at their net asset value, equal to the Foundation's pro-rata share of the total fair value of the underlying securities comprising the common funds. The common funds that are managed by TBFA are exempt from registration requirements of both state and federal securities law.

TBFA invests in several alternative investments for further diversification of its common funds. Alternative investments are more illiquid than traditional investments, often taking three to twelve months or more to redeem, pending the completion of the final year-end close of the fund.

The Foundation has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Directors, the spending policy payout percentage is calculated as 4.75% of the September 30 market value if the September 30 market value is 8% or greater of the cumulative principal contributions. If the value is less than 8%, 90% of the investment income from October 1 – September 30 will be paid.

Investments Held for Others

Investments held for others include resources held and managed by the Foundation in a fiduciary capacity for their respective beneficiaries.

Concentration of Credit Risk

TBFA maintains the Foundation's investment accounts with a national investment firm to facilitate the investment, trading, and safekeeping of the various trusts' assets. In management's opinion, the safekeeping of these assets is adequately insured by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) and through supplemental insurance provided by the investment firm.

Income Taxes

The Foundation is organized as a not-for-profit and has been granted tax-exempt status by the Internal Revenue Service for income tax purposes.

NOTE 4 - RETIREMENT PLANS

The Foundation makes contributions for its employees to a defined contribution retirement plan maintained by GuideStone Financial Resources, an entity affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention. The plan is maintained by the Convention. The Foundation makes non-matching contributions to employee accounts equal to 10% of the employee's salary. The Foundation matches employee contributions, up to 5% of the employee's salary, based on years of service. Employees are eligible for participation after one full year of employment and are fully vested at the time eligibility for participation is met. Contributions to the plan totaled \$8,422 and \$8,061 during the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

NOTE 5 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Foundation is affiliated with the Convention and receives administrative support. The Convention provided \$1,200 in administrative support to the Foundation during each of the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021. The Foundation also administers certain assets for the Convention, whose value totaled \$1,314,794 and \$1,377,501 at December 31, 2022 and 2021, and is included in investments held for others. The Foundation pays the Convention \$7,200 per year for office rental.

NOTE 6 - FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES

The financial statements contain certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one program or supporting function. Therefore, expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include salaries and employee benefits and office expenses. Management determined, based on the nature of the Foundation's operations, that the principal driver of expenses is time spent by the Foundation director and is used as the basis for allocating these expenses.

NOTE 7 - THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF ALABAMA

As mentioned previously, TBFA holds approximately 98% of the Foundation's investment instruments. Because of the large amount of money TBFA manages for the Foundation, it is recommended that the Executive Board review TBFA audited financial statements as well as any policy and procedure documents deemed relevant.

The audited financial statements for TBFA contain disclosures regarding the treatment of investment instruments, fair value accounting of investment instruments and various other accounting principles used by TBFA. The disclosures contained within the aforementioned financial statements are relevant to the Foundation due to the amount of investment instruments managed by TBFA for the Foundation. However, these disclosures are outside the scope of the preparation engagement and not included in the notes to these financial statements.

The members of Ogburn & White, LLC are full-time employees of TBFA.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION AND ITS AGENCIES

CONSTITUTION OF THE

ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.,

THE

ALASKA BAPTIST FAMILY SERVICES, INC. AND THE

ALASKA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this body shall be the Alaska Baptist Convention, Inc. The address is 1750 O'Malley Road, Anchorage, Alaska 99507.

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purpose of the Alaska Baptist Convention, hereafter known as the Convention, shall be to furnish a medium of cooperation for the cooperating Baptist churches of Alaska in their divinely commissioned work of missions, education, and benevolence in obedience to the Great Commission of Jesus Christ, and to cooperate with the work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The member of this Corporation is the Convention in session which shall consist of messengers elected by Baptist churches in Alaska contributing to the Convention through the Cooperative Program, (as reflected in the most recent annual church profile) cooperating with and sympathetic with its purpose and work and in harmony with the general doctrinal reflections of the Baptist Faith and Message.

SECTION 2. Each church, meeting the criteria in SECTION 1 of this Article, shall be entitled to two (2) messengers to the Convention, and one additional messenger for each one percent of its undesignated funds given to the Convention through the Cooperative Program. No church shall be entitled to more than twelve (12) messengers except as defined in SECTION 3. All messengers shall be resident members in good standing of the cooperation Convention Church/Mission that elects them.

SECTION 3. Each church-type mission shall be entitled to one (1) messenger from that mission to the Convention and such messenger does not count toward the limit of twelve (12) messengers from the sponsoring church.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Convention shall meet annually. The dates and places of the annual meeting are to be approved at least two (2) years in advance by the Convention.

SECTION 2. The annual meeting of the Convention and all associated committees shall be conducted with messengers physically present in a single room or area giving opportunity for simultaneous aural communication among all participants. These meetings may be conducted electronically, or in a hybrid (having both in-person and electronic attendees) manner when (a) the President or First Vice-President has obtained written consent for this from a majority of the Executive Board members; (b) when so directed by the Board; or (c) in the case of special meetings, when so directed by those calling the special meeting. Electronic meetings shall be conducted through use of Internet meeting services designated by the President that support anonymous voting and support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognition to

speak, showing (or permitting the retrieval of) the text of pending motions, and showing the results of votes. These electronic meetings of the Convention and its committees shall be subject to all rules adopted by the Convention to govern them, which may include any reasonable limitation on, and requirements for, Messenger participation. Any such rules adopted by the Convention shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority, but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the Convention. An anonymous vote conducted through the designated Internet meeting service or online survey tool shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be conducted by ballot.

SECTION 3. Special sessions of the Convention may be called by the messengers in session or by the Executive Board by a two-thirds vote of the Board. The call for the special session shall state the purpose of the meeting and the time, date and place for the meeting. The special session shall be limited to the purpose stated.

SECTION 4. Quorum. The majority of the registered messengers present for the annual or special session shall constitute a quorum. **SECTION 5.** Voting by proxy is not permitted.

ARTICLE V AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. This Convention is an autonomous body made up of messengers in session from cooperating Baptist churches in Alaska to fulfill the purpose for which the Convention was organized by the churches. The messengers have no right to act except for the annual or special meetings for which they have been elected by their cooperating churches.

SECTION 2. This Convention shall never claim or attempt to exercise authority over any church or any other Baptist body but shall always cheerfully recognize and uphold the church's autonomy under Christ.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and Recording Secretary who shall be elected at each annual meeting by the duly elected messengers present and voting, and who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and installed. The officers of the Convention are eligible to serve two complete successive terms. The officers shall assume office at the close of the Convention at which they are elected. The office of the treasurer shall be filled by the Executive Director of the Convention who is elected for an indefinite term by the Convention. The Convention may establish other officers as it deems necessary and helpful to its work.

SECTION 2. If the President, for any reason, cannot complete the term for which elected, then the First Vice President shall immediately become President and shall serve for the remainder of the term. If the First Vice President is unable to serve, the Second Vice President shall fill the office. The Second Vice President shall succeed to the office of First Vice President in the event of a vacancy in that office

SECTION 3. The employees or immediate family of an employee (spouse, child, or sibling) of the Convention or its Agencies shall not be eligible for election to the offices of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, or Recording Secretary.

SECTION 4. No member of the immediate family of an employee of the Convention or its agencies may serve as a member of the Boards of Directors.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION AND ITS AGENCIES

ARTICLE VII

CONVENTION COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Convention shall organize its work into standing, annual and special committees. All committee members shall be members of cooperating Convention churches.

To establish or dissolve a Standing or Annual Committee, a request must be submitted in writing detailing the purpose of adding or dissolving the committee to the ABC Executive Committee 30 days prior to the ABC Executive Board meeting. The Board will vote on the recommendation. If the Board approves the recommendation, then the request to establish or dissolve the committee will be presented to the Constitution and Bylaws Committee 60 days prior to the next annual meeting for a two-thirds (2/3) vote in the affirmative.

SECTION 2. The standing committees are the Constitution and Bylaws Committee and the Resolutions Committee. The Constitution and Bylaws Committee shall have five members elected to serve a three (3) year rotation term. The members shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected one-third each year by the Convention. The Resolutions Committee shall consist of the ABC officers and the ABC Executive Director. Job descriptions for these committees are located in ABC Bylaws, Article V, Section 1 (a) and (b)

SECTION 3. The annual committees shall have five (5) members. The annual committees shall serve an annual term and shall be appointed by the President in consultation with the other officers within forty-five (45) days of the conclusion of the Annual Session. Appointed members shall be notified by mail by the President of the Convention. The annual committees are (1) Order of Business, (2) Credentials, (3) Time, Place, and Preacher, (4) Committee on Committees, (5) Committee on Boards.

SECTION 4. The Convention may approve special committees for a specific purpose and term, and these committees shall be appointed by the President in consultation with the Vice Presidents.

SECTION 5. The qualifications and responsibilities of the committees shall be contained in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall serve as the Convention ad interim and as the Convention's principal advisory committee on its total program. The Executive Board shall serve as the Convention's operating board for all programs not specifically assigned elsewhere. The Board's responsibilities are defined in the Convention's Bylaws. SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall be composed of the Convention officers, President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, and sixteen (16) directors elected for a four (4) year rotation term, one-fourth elected each year. The Committee on Boards recommendations is to be forwarded to the Convention office at least ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Convention. All Board members shall be members of cooperating Convention churches.

SECTION 3. The directors shall be elected as members at large, except that the Board shall include at least one person whose church is in the geographical area of each association. At least six of the members shall be laity, at least six clergies, and the remainder shall be either.

SECTION 4. Officers of the Executive Board are President, to be filled by the President of the Convention, Vice President, to be filled by the First Vice President of the Convention, and Secretary, to be

filled by the Recording Secretary of the Convention. The Second Vice President of the Convention may be appointed by the President to perform the duties of any office if a vacancy occurs.

SECTION 5. No director shall serve more than one term of any length on the Board with the exception of directors who have served less than twenty-four (24) months while completing the term of another. A board member is not eligible for re-election until one year expires between the ending of one term and the beginning of the next. No more than two directors shall be elected from any one church, and at least one of these must be from a church-type mission sponsored by the church. A nominee must have been active in a cooperative Baptist church in Alaska for at least twelve (12) months. Employees of the Convention or its agencies are not eligible to serve.

SECTION 6. If a vacancy occurs, the Executive Board may elect a qualified person to serve until the next regular Annual Convention, such person being recommended by the Committee on Boards. In no case may a vacancy continue for longer than six (6) months or until the next Annual Convention, whichever occurs first. The Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE IX AGENCIES

SECTION 1. The agencies of the Convention are Alaska Baptist Family Services Inc. and Alaska Baptist Foundation Inc. All candidates for nomination to agency boards shall have been a member of a cooperating Baptist church in Alaska for at least twelve (12) months.

SECTION 2. The Convention in annual session shall approve or amend the Articles of Incorporation of the agencies by a two-thirds vote, providing no amendment may be considered after the second session of the Annual Convention, and that the proposed amendment be submitted in writing to the President of the Executive Board of the Convention at least one-hundred twenty (120) days prior to the Annual Convention. The Executive Board must submit the recommended changes to the Convention office sixty (60) days prior to the annual session. Notice of amendments must be published in the state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Convention.

SECTION 3. The Board of Directors shall be elected by the Convention for a three-year term, one-third elected each year, and shall be nominated by the Committee on Boards. The number of directors, their qualifications, and responsibilities, shall be contained in the Agency's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws. The Committee on Boards' recommendations shall be forwarded to the Convention office and the Executive Board ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Convention.

SECTION 4. If a vacancy occurs, the Executive Board may elect a qualified person to serve until the next regular Annual Convention, such person being recommended by the Committee on Boards. In no case may a vacancy continue for longer than six (6) months or until the next Annual Convention, whichever occurs first. The Convention shall at its next regular annual session fill the vacancy for the remainder of the term.

SECTION 5. Agency Boards of Directors or any individual director of said Boards may be replaced by the Convention in session, or the Executive Board for misfeasance, incapacity, failure to perform their proper duties, conduct which would bring discredit upon the corporation, or transferring membership from a church or mission cooperating with the Convention.

CONSTITUTION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION AND ITS AGENCIES

SECTION 6. The Convention shall exercise oversight of the agencies; however, the management of the affairs of each agency shall be by its elected Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall hold title to properties, real and personal; to act as a fiduciary, fiscal representative and agent of the agency; to employ agency personnel; to make contracts in behalf of the agency; to conduct long-range planning to reach the objectives of the agency; to approve capital improvements and expansion up to \$500,000.

SECTION 7. Each agency shall report to the Convention in annual session; this report shall include financial assessment reports, projected budgets, progress on program objectives in light of long-range plans, and other necessary information as may be requested by the Convention or its Executive Director.

SECTION 8. The agencies are prohibited by the Convention from engaging in fundraising without specific approval by the Convention.

SECTION 9. The relationship between Convention and an agency shall not be discontinued without a majority vote on such action at two consecutive Annual Conventions. Notice of the discontinuance must be published in the state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Convention.

SECTION 10. Upon the dissolution of an agency, the remaining assets, after liabilities are paid and discharged, are to be transferred to the Convention or if the Convention is no longer in existence, to a charitable, educational, religious, or other similar organization that is qualified under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

SECTION 11. The Convention in Annual Session, by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting, can create a new agency providing a comprehensive plan of development, a set of Articles and Bylaws, and an annual budget recommended by the Executive Board. These documents shall have been shared with the Convention through the state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches at least ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Convention.

ARTICLE X INDEBTEDNESS

All borrowing by this Convention for its own use, or for its agencies and institutions, or borrowing by any institution or agency, which directly or indirectly obligates this Convention, the payment of which would require an extension of time beyond the close of the subsequent fiscal year, shall be authorized only on the following terms and conditions.

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall have the authority to borrow funds in anticipation of current revenue, provided that any unpaid balance of such borrowing at the end of the current fiscal year shall be provided in and made a part of the budget for the subsequent year.

SECTION 2. Neither this Convention, nor any institution or agency, owned or supported in whole or in part by this Convention, shall accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any gift, grant, or aid from the federal or state governments or any government agency, except for definite services rendered by the agency or institution. Such must have the approval of the agency's Board and reported in full to the Convention's Executive Board.

SECTION 3. No institution or agency of this Convention shall encumber its real property or change its status with respect to this Convention without authority from this Convention.

SECTION 4. Institutions and agencies of this Convention shall have the authority to borrow money in anticipation of current revenue,

provided that any unpaid balance of such borrowing at the end of the current fiscal year shall be provided for in and made a part of the budget for the subsequent current year.

SECTION 5. Any anticipated borrowing of funds in excess of the provisions of the above sections must have the specific approval of the Convention in session.

ARTICLE XI FISCAL YEAR

This Convention's fiscal year shall close on the Friday after the last Sunday of the year.

ARTICLE XII PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order, New Revised (Latest Edition), shall govern the meetings of the Convention in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Convention's Constitution, Bylaws or any special rules of order. The President may appoint a parliamentarian who shall serve at the pleasure of the President.

ARTICLE XIII INDEMNIFICATION

The Convention, and its respective agencies for their work, shall indemnify any director or officer or former director or officer of the Corporation, and their respective heirs, administrators, successors, and assigns, against any and all expenses, including amounts paid upon judgments, counsel fees, and amounts paid in settlement (before or after suit is commenced), actually and reasonably incurred by such persons in connection with the defense or settlement of any claim, action, suit or proceeding in which they, or any of them, are made parties, or a party, or which may be asserted against them or any of them, by reason of having been directors or officers or a director or officer of the Corporation; provided, however, that such indemnity should not be operative with respect to (a) any matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such director, officer, or employee, or (b) any matter settled or compromised, unless, in the opinion of independent counsel selected by or in a manner determined by the directors, there is not reasonable ground for such person's being adjudged liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such directors or officer.

ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENT

Amendments may be made in this Constitution by a vote of twothirds of the members present when the vote is taken without regard to total enrollment at any annual meeting of the Convention, provided (1) no amendment may be considered after the second session of the Convention, (2) and that the proposed change be submitted in writing to the Convention office and the Constitution and Bylaws Committee at least ninety (90) days prior to the Annual Convention and published in state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Convention.

ARTICLE I **NAME**

The name of this non-profit Corporation shall be the Alaska Baptist Convention, Inc. The address is 1750 O'Malley Road, Anchorage, Alaska 99507.

ARTICLE II **DURATION**

The period of duration is perpetual.

ARTICLE III NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

The Corporation is a non-profit Corporation organized under the Alaska Non-Profit Corporation Act and shall have all the powers, duties, authorizations and responsibilities as provided therein. The corporation shall neither have nor exercise any power, nor engage directly or indirectly in any activity that would invalidate its status as an organization exempt from federal income tax and described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the corresponding provision or provisions of any subsequent the United States Internal Revenue law or laws (the "Internal Revenue Code of 1986"), or that would invalidate its status as a non-profit Corporation under the Alaska Non-Profit Corporation Act.

ARTICLE IV **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this non-profit Corporation, hereafter known as the Convention, shall be to furnish a medium of cooperation for the cooperating Baptist churches of Alaska in their divinely commissioned work of missions, education, and benevolence.

ARTICLE V **MEMBERSHIP**

SECTION 1. The members of this Convention shall consist of messengers to the Convention in session, elected by the Baptist churches in Alaska, cooperating with and contributing to the Convention through the Cooperative Program, and sympathetic with its purposes and work and in harmony with the general doctrinal reflections of the Baptist Faith and Message.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to messengers to the Convention, the number, criteria, rights, and responsibilities of messengers to be established in the Convention's Constitution and Bylaws.

ARTICLE VI **MEETINGS**

SECTION 1. Regular and special meetings of the Alaska Baptist Convention and all associated committees shall occur as set forth in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Alaska Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE VII **GOVERNANCE**

SECTION 1. This Convention is an autonomous body made up of messengers in session from cooperating Baptist churches in Alaska to fulfill the purpose for which the Convention was organized by the churches.

SECTION 2. This Convention shall never attempt to exercise authority over any cooperating church but shall always cheerfully recognize and uphold the church's autonomy under Christ. SECTION 3. The Convention shall receive assets for the approved work of the Convention and its agencies, and shall dispense these funds according to the expressed will and direction of the Convention.

ARTICLE VIII **OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. The officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President and Recording Secretary who shall be elected at each annual meeting by the duly elected messengers present and voting, and who shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and installed. The office of treasurer shall be filled by the Executive Director of the Alaska Baptist Convention who is elected for an indefinite term by the Alaska Baptist Convention. The Convention may establish other offices through its Constitution and Bylaws as it deems necessary and helpful to its work. SECTION 2. If the President, for any reason, cannot complete the term for which elected, then the First Vice President shall immediately become President and shall serve for the remainder of the term. If the First Vice President is unable to serve, the Second Vice President shall fill the office.

SECTION 3. The employees or immediate family of an employee (spouse, child, or sibling) of the Convention or its Agencies shall not be eligible for election to the offices of President, First Vice President, Second Vice President or Recording Secretary.

ARTICLE IX DISSOLUTION

Upon dissolution of Alaska Baptist Convention, Inc., the Executive Board [serving at the time] shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the Corporation, dispose of all the assets of the Corporation exclusively for the purposes of the Corporation in such a manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for religious purposes as shall be at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future Internal Revenue Code), as the Executive Board shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be dispersed by the Superior Court of the Borough in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization(s), as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE X REGISTERED AND PRINCIPAL OFFICE

The address of the initial registered and principal office of the Alaska Baptist Convention, Inc. in Alaska is 1750 O'Malley Road, Anchorage, Alaska 99507. All mail should be sent to 1750 O'Malley Road, Anchorage, Alaska 99507.

ARTICLE XI

BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND MEMBERS OF COMMITTEES SECTION 1. Directors of the Boards and members of committees shall be elected by the Convention, and the plan of organization shall be established in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board shall serve as the Convention ad interim and as the Convention's principal advisory committee on its total program.

SECTION 3. The Executive Board shall serve as the Convention's operating board for all programs not specifically assigned elsewhere.

ARTICLE XII CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The Convention shall establish a Constitution and Bylaws consistent with these articles.

ARTICLE XIII INDEBTEDNESS

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the Convention may be subject shall be defined in the Convention's Constitution and Bylaws.

ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENT

Alterations may be made in these Articles by a vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken, without regard to total enrollment, at an annual meeting of the Convention, provided (1) no amendment may be considered after the second session of the Convention and (2) that an amendment shall be so approved by two successive annual Conventions and (3) that the proposed change be submitted in writing to the President of the Executive Board of the Convention at least one hundred twenty (120) days prior to the annual session and submitted by the Executive Board to the Convention office sixty (60) days prior to the annual session then and published in the state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches thirty (30) days prior to the annual session.

ARTICLE XV AUTHORITY-SUPERSEDE

These Articles of Incorporation correctly set forth the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation of the ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION as amended. They have been adopted as required by law and they supersede the original Articles of Incorporation and all amendments.

ARTICLE XVI ADOPTION

Following notice as provided by law and the Bylaws of the Corporation, and at meetings on the 9th day of August 2000 and the 8th day of August 2001, at which there was a quorum of members present, the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were adopted by a two-thirds majority of members entitled to vote.

ARTICLE XVII SUPERSEDURE

Except for the designated amendments, these Restated Articles of Incorporation correctly set out without changing the provisions of the articles being amended, and the Restated Articles together with the designated amendments supersede the original Articles of Incorporation.

ALASKA BAPTIST CONVENTION, INC.

ARTICLE I MESSENGERS

SECTION 1. Each qualifying church, as stated in Article III of the Constitution, shall present to the Credentials Committee of the Convention a list of its elected messengers, according to the Constitution, Article III, received or post-marked no less than thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting if possible. If for some reason the church cannot comply with this request, messengers will be permitted to register the day of the meeting, provided they have written authority by the church's pastor or clerk to act as "messenger" on behalf of the church. Special sessions may be convened in accordance with Article II, Section 4.

SECTION 2. Each messenger shall register with the Credentials Committee prior to being seated as a messenger to the Convention. SECTION 3. The Credentials Committee shall review the credentials of the registered messengers and make its report to the Convention as the first item of business in the first meeting of the Annual Convention.

ARTICLE II MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The regular meetings of the Convention shall be known as the Annual Convention, and shall be for the purpose of electing officers, receiving reports of officers, committees, and boards, and for any other business that may arise.

SECTION 2. The annual meeting of the Convention and all associated committees shall be conducted with messengers physically present in a single room or area giving opportunity for simultaneous aural communication among all participants. These meetings may be conducted electronically, or in a hybrid (having both in-person and electronic attendees) manner when (a) the President or First Vice-President has obtained written consent for this from a majority of the Executive Board members; (b) when so directed by the Board; or (c) in the case of special meetings, when so directed by those calling the special meeting. Electronic meetings shall be conducted through use of Internet meeting services designated by the President that support anonymous voting and support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognition to speak, showing (or permitting the retrieval of) the text of pending motions, and showing the results of votes. These electronic meetings of the Convention or its committees shall be subject to all rules adopted by the Convention to govern them, which may include any reasonable limitation on, and requirements for, Messenger participation. Any such rules adopted by the Convention shall supersede any conflicting rules in the parliamentary authority, but may not otherwise conflict with or alter any rule or decision of the Convention. An anonymous vote conducted through the designated Internet meeting service or online survey tool shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the bylaws or rules that a vote be conducted by

SECTION 3. Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised (Latest Edition) shall be recognized as the standard authority to guide the Convention on questions of parliamentary law and custom. SECTION 4. The Convention shall determine its order of business at the first meeting of the Annual Convention.

SECTION 5. Special sessions of the Convention may be scheduled. The Executive Board may call the Convention into special session

if it deems it necessary; a two-thirds vote is necessary to do so. The Convention in session can call for a special session by a majority vote. A thirty (30) day notice must be given in writing to each church and must state the purpose of the special session. Names of messengers must be provided to the convention office no less than five days prior to the special session

SECTION 6. The minutes of the Annual Convention shall be approved by the Executive Board in its organizational meeting following the Annual Convention. The minutes of the business sessions shall be reported by the Recording Secretary in the state Baptist paper in the month following the Annual Convention.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, and Recording Secretary. The office of Treasurer shall be filled by the Executive Director of the Convention for an indefinite term.

SECTION 2. Officers shall be chosen annually from messengers in attendance at the Convention. Officers shall be members of cooperating Alaska Baptist Convention churches. Nominations shall be from the floor, and election shall be in a following session. The election shall be by ballot except when there is a single nominee for an office. In the latter case, the President shall instruct the secretary to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominee.

SECTION 3. Employees or immediate family of an employee (spouse, child, or sibling) of the Convention or its agencies, are not eligible to serve as elected officers of the Convention, with the exception of the Executive Director-Treasurer, who serves an indefinite term.

SECTION 4. Officers shall serve for one (1) year and hold office until their successors are elected and qualified; however, no officer may serve more than two (2) complete successive terms in the same office. Terms of office shall commence at final adjournment of the Convention in session at the time of their election and terminate at final adjournment of the succeeding regular session of the Convention. In case of death, disability of, or other cause making necessary the retirement of the President, the Vice Presidents shall succeed in order. The Executive Board shall determine when an office is vacant due to the disability of an incumbent.

SECTION 5. The President shall preside over the deliberations of the Convention and shall perform such duties as may be customary to the position or as determined in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention and shall, by his election, become an ex officio member, with vote, of all Convention agencies, committees and boards. He shall serve as an advisor to the Executive Board for one full year immediately following tenure as President of the Convention. The President is empowered to appoint the First or Second Vice Presidents to serve as ex officio member, with a vote, of any agency, committee or board in his/her place.

SECTION 6. The Vice Presidents may, in the absence of the President or when requested by the President, preside over the Convention and shall perform such other duties as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention or as requested by the President.

SECTION 7. The Recording Secretary shall certify and produce the official minutes of all sessions of the Convention and Executive Board minutes.

ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

SECTION 1. The Convention shall employ an Executive Director as its chief executive officer and treasurer. He shall provide spiritual leadership for the total program of the Convention.

SECTION 2. When a vacancy of the Executive Director position occurs, the Executive Board of the Convention shall recommend a candidate for the position of Executive Director to the Convention. The Executive Committee of the Board plus three members of the Executive Board elected at large by the Executive Board in executive session will serve as the Search Committee. The Search Committee will bring a recommendation to the Executive Board. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Executive Board is necessary to nominate a candidate to the Convention in session. With permission of the candidate, the Executive Board shall release biographical data to the churches of the Convention. When a vacancy occurs, the Executive Board may select an interim Executive Director to serve until the Convention acts to elect a successor.

SECTION 3. The Convention in session, either in an Annual Convention or in a special session called for such purpose, shall elect an Executive Director for an indefinite term upon the recommendation of the Executive Board.

SECTION 4. The Policies Manual shall describe the tasks and responsibilities of the Executive Director.

SECTION 5. The Convention in session may terminate the Executive Director by majority vote. Or the Executive Board may terminate the Executive Director by a two-thirds vote of the elected Directors.

ARTICLE V CONVENTION COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. STANDING COMMITTEES

The Committee on Committees shall nominate the Constitution and Bylaws Committee, including its chairperson, for election by the Convention in session. The committees will elect their own secretary. The committees will schedule its meetings as needed but should utilize the times around activities of the Convention, such as the Evangelism Conference. The committee should review its work and consult with the Convention President and Executive Director. The Resolutions Committee shall be composed of the ABC officers and the Executive Director.

- (a) Constitution and Bylaws Committee. The principal duty of the committee is to review the Constitution and Bylaws of the Alaska Baptist Convention and the Bylaws of its agencies and to recommend changes it deems necessary. The committee should present its recommendations to the Executive Director, and the Executive Board, ninety (90) days prior to the annual session, and publish the recommendations in the state Baptist paper or mail to the churches thirty (30) days prior to the annual session.
- (b) Resolutions Committee. The committee shall review all properly submitted resolutions and shall present resolutions to the Convention for its consideration. All proposed resolutions to the Convention are to be submitted in writing to the Convention Office 45 days prior to the annual meeting.

SECTION 2. ANNUAL COMMITTEES

Annual Committees and their chairperson are appointed by the President of the Convention, in consultation with the other officers, within forty-five (45) days following the Annual Convention.

(a) Order of Business Committee. The committee is to plan the pro-

- gram for the Annual Convention. They will also assist the President and the Executive Director in enlisting program personnel; assist the President in amending the order of business during the convention, and assist with other related matters as requested.
- (b) Credentials Committee. The committee is to certify messengers from churches of the Alaska Baptist Convention. They will present messengers with badges, ballots, and materials for the execution of their duties. The committee will also assist the President in all balloting, certifying votes, and elections, and assist in related matters as requested.
- (c) Committee on Committees. The committee is to recommend committee members according to the requirements of the Constitution and Bylaws. They are to gather suggestions from the churches, including biographical data, and if possible, schedule an interview by one of the members with the candidate. The committee should present a progress report to the Executive Board at its spring meeting and a full report is to be sent to the Executive Director for the Book of Reports for the Convention by sixty (60) days prior to the annual session.
- (d) Time, Place, and Preacher Committee. The committee is to select an adequate site for the annual meeting of the Convention, considering the rotation of cities for the Convention, availability of local Baptist families to host messengers, adequate meeting space, and adequate hotel/motel rooms. The committee will name the convention preacher and the alternate for the next annual meeting. The Executive Board will recommend to the committee the times and dates of the annual meeting two to five years in advance.
- (e) Committee on Boards. The committee is to recommend members for the Executive Board of the Convention and members for the Board of Directors of the agencies of the Convention according to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention. Nominees are to be chosen at large keeping a balance such as male/female, race, clergy/laity and area of residence in the state. At least one person whose church is in the geographical area of each association shall be included. The committee should present a progress report to the Executive Board at its spring meeting and a full report is to be sent to the Executive Director for the Book of Reports for the Convention by sixty (60) days prior to the annual session.

ARTICLE VI EXECUTIVE BOARD

SECTION 1. The Executive Board shall organize itself at the first Board meeting following the Annual Baptist Convention's Annual Session. The organization shall include an Executive Committee, an Administration and Personnel Committee, Budget and Finance Committee, and Missions and Church Development Committee. The Board may establish other committees as needed. With the exception of the Executive Committee, each committee will have at least six members. In consultation with the Executive Director, First and Second Vice Presidents, and the Recording Secretary, the President shall complete said organizational recommendations within thirty (30) days following the Alaska Baptist Convention's Annual Session. In the event of an emergency requiring Board action between the Annual Session and first scheduled Executive Board Meeting, the President, in consultation with the other officers, shall create a temporary Executive Committee for the purpose of dealing with matters requiring emergency action. This said committee to be recommended to the Executive Board for approval at its first meeting. SECTION 2. Executive Committee. The Executive Board shall establish an Executive Committee which shall meet as necessary

between sessions of the Executive Board. The Executive Committee shall perform the duties assigned to it by the Executive Board. The Executive Committee is made up of the four elected ABC officers, the three Executive Board Committee Chairs, and the Executive Director. The specific duties of the committee are to perform duties between sessions of the Executive Board as assigned, help prepare Board agenda, recommend the Executive Board organization and temporary work groups, supervise the Executive Director on behalf of the Board, serve as the search committee for an Executive Director (along with three Executive Board members elected at large) when vacancy occurs, and work with the Executive Director in the recommendation of prospective elected staff personnel. Any decisions approved by the Executive Committee would need a majority vote. In the case of a tie vote, the action would be referred to the appropriate Executive Board Committee for discussion and brought before the Board at the next Board meeting for vote. Five members of the Executive Committee must vote in the affirmative to pass any measure regardless of how many committee members are present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Administration and Personnel Committee. The committee will recommend staff organization and personnel policies to the Executive Board, oversee the state Baptist paper, and review with the Executive Director the support staff employment policies and procedures.

SECTION 4. Missions and Church Development Committee. The committee is to oversee functions and programs of Church Planting and Ministry Evangelism. The committee will work with staff in long-range planning, proposing program objectives and priorities to the Board and in the evaluation of program accomplishments. It will also make requests for calendar dates, allocation of budget and capital needs, and will recommend the assignment and support of missionary personnel. The committee is to recommend the annual goal and expenditures of the Valeria Sherard State Mission Offering, Annie Armstrong North American Mission Offering, Lottie Moon International Mission Offering, and will oversee the 2000 Club program. The state Director of Missions and the Directors of Missions for the Associations shall be ex officio members, without a vote, of the committee.

SECTION 5. Budget and Finance Committee. The committee is to serve as the budget committee of the Board, review, evaluate and recommend financial policies of the Convention to the Executive Board, arrange for and review the annual assessment and report assessment to the Executive Board, study giving trends, review periodic financial statements, and approve line item changes within the budget as permitted by the Convention policies.

SECTION 6. The Executive Board is to serve as the Convention ad interim and as the Convention's principal advisory on its total program. The Executive Board shall not contravene the actions or policies of the Convention.

SECTION 7. To serve as the Convention's operating board for all programs not assigned to other boards.

SECTION 8. To evaluate the performance of the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention, and to assist him in the exercise of his duties as the chief executive officer and spiritual leader in carrying out the programs of the Convention.

SECTION 9. To act as fiduciary, fiscal representative and agent of the Convention in all matters not assigned to agencies' boards, to execute any and all deeds, mortgages, deeds of trust, assignments, or other conveyance that the Executive Board may deem in its official capacity. SECTION 10. The Convention herewith empowers and directs the President of the Convention or the Executive Director of the Convention, to sign in an official capacity for the Convention all such aforementioned deeds, mortgages, deeds of trust, assignments, or other conveyances.

SECTION 11. All gifts of money other than the general budget of the Alaska Baptist Convention or other property made to the corporation shall be disbursed according to the donor's designation. The corporation shall have the power at all times to accept or reject designated gifts. Undesignated gifts shall be distributed in accordance with the Corporation's budget.

SECTION 12. To act upon the recommendations of the Committee on Committees and Committee on Boards to fill any vacancies occurring between Annual Conventions.

SECTION 13. To have oversight of the arrangements of the Convention sessions.

SECTION 14. To present to the Convention a proposed budget for the forthcoming year. The Budget and Finance Committee of the Board shall serve as the budget committee for the Convention. The Executive Board shall publish and distribute to all the churches of the Convention copies of the proposed budget at least thirty (30) days before submitting it to the Convention for final approval. SECTION 15. To establish and revise policies relating to the duties assigned to the Executive Board by the Convention and to maintain a Policies Manual. The Executive Board shall work closely with the Executive Director to ensure an organization that is both functional and accountable. The Policies Manual is subject to the review and amendment of a simple majority of the Executive Board SECTION 16. To be responsible for long-range planning of the Convention and its programs and to coordinate the long-range planning of an agency's board with the total Alaska Baptist Convention program.

SECTION 17. To assist the Budget and Finance Committee in the fulfillment of their duties in the assessment of the Convention's financial records, to receive and publish their reports in the Book of Reports, and to act upon their recommendations concerning the management of the accounts.

SECTION 18. To approve staff organization and to employ elected staff personnel upon recommendation of the Executive Director. The Executive Board shall approve personnel policies.

SECTION 19. Directors are expected to attend all Executive Board committee meetings and plenary sessions. Failure to do so may result in their removal by the Executive Board or the Convention in session. The Director is responsible for notifying the President or the Convention office in case of an emergency necessitating an absence. SECTION 20. The Executive Board shall meet at least two (2) times a year and additional times as determined by the Board. The organizational meeting of the Executive Board shall be held following the Annual Convention.

SECTION 21. Meetings of the Executive Board and all associated committees shall be conducted with board members physically present in a single room or area giving opportunity for simultaneous aural communication among all participants. These meetings may be conducted electronically, or in a hybrid (having both in-person and electronic attendees) manner when (a) the President or First Vice-President has obtained written consent for this from a majority of the Board members; (b) when so directed by the Board; or (c) in the case of special meetings, when so directed by those calling the special meeting. Electronic meetings shall be conducted through use of Internet meeting services designated by the President that support

SECTION 23. A majority of the Executive Board shall be considered a quorum.

SECTION 24. To prepare and publish a comprehensive report of the affairs of the Convention and a summary of the actions taken by the Executive Board in an Annual Book of Reports.

SECTION 25. To publish a summary of the Executive Board actions in the state Baptist paper after each session.

ARTICLE VII AMENDMENTS

Amendments may be made in these Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken without regard to total enrollment at any annual meeting of the Convention, provided (1) no amendment may be considered after the second session of the Convention, (2) and that the proposed change be submitted in writing to the Convention office and to the Constitution Bylaws Committee at least one hundred twenty (120) days prior to the Annual Convention and published in state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches thirty (30) days prior to the annual Convention.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST FAMILY SERVICES, INC.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST FAMILY SERVICES, INC.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this Corporation is Alaska Baptist Family Services, Inc., and the period of duration is perpetual. The address is 1600 O'Malley Road, Anchorage, Alaska 99507

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purpose of this corporation is to conduct the programs of childcare and Christian counseling, which has been assigned to the corporation by the Alaska Baptist Convention. The Corporation shall conduct these programs on behalf of the Alaska Baptist Convention and its churches.

ARTICLE III NON-PROFIT

SECTION 1. The Corporation is a non-profit Corporation and shall have a perpetual existence. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, trustee, officer of the corporation, or any private individual except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation. No member, director, officer of the Corporation, or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets.

SECTION 2. In case of dissolution, all properties and assets shall be returned to the Alaska Baptist Convention after all liabilities have been paid and discharged.

SECTION 3. No part of the activities of the Corporation shall be carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, or participating in, or intervening in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

ARTICLE IV MEMBERSHIP

The member of this Corporation is the Alaska Baptist Convention in session, which shall consist of messengers elected by Baptist churches in Alaska contributing to the Convention through the Cooperative Program, cooperating with and sympathetic with its purpose and work and in harmony with the general doctrinal reflections of the Baptist Faith and Message. The meetings of the member shall be as provided in the Constitution and By-laws of the Alaska Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE I PURPOSE AND MEMBERSHIP

The purpose and membership of the Corporation are set forth in the Articles of Incorporation of Alaska Baptist Family Services.

ARTICLE II AUTHORITY

The Board of Directors are elected by the Alaska Baptist Convention to manage the corporation and to fulfill an assigned purpose in keeping with the goals and spiritual commitments of the Alaska Baptist Convention. The directors and the board shall not act contrary to these goals and commitments.

ARTICLE III PROGRAMS

SECTION 1. PROGRAM OF CHILDCARE: The Corporation shall conduct and manage a childcare program on behalf of the Alaska Baptist Convention and its churches. The program may include residential care, adoptive services, foster home care, and other services to children as deemed appropriate by the directors of the Corporation. The Corporation shall not discriminate against children because of race, religion, or residency within the State of Alaska. SECTION 2. PROGRAM OF CHRISTIAN COUNSELING: The Corporation shall conduct and manage a program of Christian counseling in Alaska on behalf of the Alaska Baptist Convention and its member churches. The services may include counseling to the staff, children, and families of the Corporation's child-care program, the members of the churches of the Alaska Baptist Convention, and the general public, as resources permit. The program also may include a Corporation directed program of training and supervising of

ARTICLE IV BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Christian counselors, giving priority to the staff and members of the

churches of the Alaska Baptist Convention.

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of nine (9) persons who are elected by the Alaska Baptist Convention in session. The nominated directors shall have been an active member of a Baptist church cooperating with the Alaska Baptist Convention for at least one year and as further defined in Article V Section 2 (e) of the Bylaws of the Alaska Baptist Convention. In addition, the President of the Convention, the Executive Director of the Convention, and the Executive Director of the Alaska Baptist Family Services shall be ex officio members, with vote, of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2. A term of service is three (3) years. The expiration of terms should be planned so that one-third of the Directors will rotate off the Board each year. Directors having served two consecutive terms of three (3) years shall be eligible for reelection only after as much as one year has elapsed. Vacancies may be filled by the Executive Board of the Alaska Baptist Convention upon the recommendation of the Committee on Boards. The elected Directors shall take office after the close of the Alaska Baptist Convention, or immediately, if elected by the Executive Board to fill a vacancy. SECTION 3. The duties of the Board of Directors are to:

(a) act as fiduciary, fiscal representative, and agent of the Corporation.

- (b) take, hold, or transfer title to properties, both real and personal, in behalf of the Corporation,
- (c) employ personnel in behalf of the Corporation,
- (d) contract through its staff in behalf of the Corporation,
- (e) develop and conduct a long-range plan for the development of the Corporation in fulfilling its purpose,
- (f) approve capital improvement and expansion projects in behalf of the Corporation up to \$500,000,
- (g) make a comprehensive report to the Alaska Baptist Convention Annual Session concerning the conduct of the assigned programs; this report to include a finance and audit report, projected budget, program objectives, and long range goals,
- (h) develop and approve policies to guide the staff and work of the Corporation,
- (i) and other duties as may be necessary, which are not otherwise prohibited by the Alaska Baptist Convention and federal and state law, to carry out the Corporation's purpose.

SECTION 4. Standing Committees. The Board of Directors may establish one or more standing committees as needed and their organization and responsibilities shall be defined in the Policies Manual.

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Elections. The Directors will elect the officers of the Alaska Baptist Family Services. Such election will regularly take place at the organization meeting of the Directors. A person elected to any office will continue to hold that office for one year or until the election of his successor.

SECTION 2. Officers

- (a) President. The President will preside at all meetings of the Directors. He shall perform such other duties as normally pertain to the office of President.

The Executive Committee shall act as a body in all matters committed to it by the Board of Directors, including emergency matters, which may arise between meetings of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI LIMITATION OF POWERS

SECTION 1. The Alaska Baptist Convention prohibits the Board to conduct fundraising without approval of the Alaska Baptist Conven-

SECTION 2. The Board cannot take any action which is contrary to the laws of Alaska and the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation, its Bylaws and policies.

SECTION 3. The Corporation cannot transfer title of the Corporation's real estate or mortgage or pledge the assets of the Corporation without the approval of the Alaska Baptist Convention.

SECTION 4. The entire Board of Directors may be replaced by the Alaska Baptist Convention, upon recommendation of the Executive Board thereof, if the Board of Trustees shall permit the corporation to incur operating expenses in excess of income available for operations.

SECTION 5. Individual members of the Board may be replaced by the Alaska Baptist Convention or the Executive Board of the Alaska Baptist Convention thereof, for misfeasance, malfeasance, incapacity, failure to perform their proper duties, or conduct which would bring discredit upon the corporation.

ARTICLE VII **INDEMNIFICATON**

The Corporation shall indemnify any trustee or officer or former director or officer of the Corporation, and their respective heirs, administrators, successors, and assigns, against any and all expenses, including amounts paid upon judgments, counsel fees, and amounts paid in settlement (before or after suit is commenced), actually and reasonably incurred by such persons in connection with the defense or settlement of any claim, action, suit or proceeding in which they, or any of them, are made parties, or a party, or which may be asserted against them or any of them, by reason of having been trustees or officers or a trustee or officer of the Corporation; provided, however, that such indemnity should not be operative with respect to (a) any matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such trustee, officer, or employee, or (b) any matter settled or compromised, unless, in the opinion of independent counsel selected by or in a manner determined by the trustees, there is not reasonable ground for such person's being adjudged liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such trustees or officer.

SECTION 2. The member, Alaska Baptist Convention, shall establish a Board of Directors to manage the affairs of the Alaska Baptist Foundation between annual meetings of the Convention.

ARTICLE II AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. To accept, acquire, receive, take, and hold by bequest, devise, grant, gift, purchase, exchange, lease, transfer, trust or act as trustee of, judicial order or decree, or otherwise for any of its objects and purpose, any property, both real and personal, of whatever kind, nature, or description and wherever situated.

SECTION 2. To sell, exchange, convey, mortgage, lease, transfer or otherwise dispose of, any such property, both real and personal, as the objects and purposes of the Corporation may require, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law.

The expiration of terms should be planned so that one-third of the directors will rotate off the board each year. Upon recommendation of the Committee on Boards, the Executive Board of the Convention may elect persons to fill vacancies until the Convention meets. SECTION 2. Duties. It shall be the duty of the Directors to invest and reinvest all funds delivered to the Corporation by gifts, devise, bequest or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income aris-

ing from such investment, and to make distribution thereof. The Directors shall faithfully make an accounting at its annual meeting of their administration of all funds entrusted to them to the Alaska Baptist Convention at its annual meetings.

SECTION 3. Authority. The Directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the Corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, releases, receipts, acquittance, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property and assets of the Corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, into the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the President or Vice President of the Board of Directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the Corporation and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. Where funds or property are given or devised to said Corporation, in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have authority of said funds or property and to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the Executive Board of the Convention or at the next session of the Alaska Baptist Convention.

SECTION 6. Quorum. A quorum of the Board shall consist of a simple majority of the eligible directors.

BYLAWS OF THE ALASKA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

SECTION 7. Committees. The Directors may, at their first meeting or any subsequent meeting, elect from their own number such committee, or committees as needed, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

SECTION 8. Compensation. No Director of this Corporation shall receive, or lawfully be entitled to receive, any salary or remuneration for services connected with the administration of the affairs of this corporation. Actual expenses incurred by any such director may be refunded when authorized.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Elections. The Directors will elect the officers of the Foundation. Such election will regularly take place at the organization meeting of the Directors. A person elected to any office will continue to hold that office for one year or until the election of a successor.

SECTION 2. Officers

Convention.

- (a) President. The President will preside at all meetings of the Directors and shall perform such other duties as normally pertain to the office of President.
- (b) Vice President. A Vice President may be elected by the Directors, who will be vested with all the powers and charged with all of the duties (including those herein specifically set forth) of the President in the event of his absence or disability. The Vice President will perform such other duties as may from time to time be delegated or assigned by the President or the directors.
- (c) Secretary. The secretary will keep the minutes of meetings of the Directors, see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws, or as required by law, be custodian of the records of the Foundation and of its seal and, in general, perform all duties incident to the office. Except, as may otherwise be specifically provided in a resolution of the Directors, the secretary will be a proper officer to impress the Foundation's seal on any instrument signed by the President or Vice President, and to attest to the same.

 (d) Treasurer. The responsibilities of Treasurer are given to the Executive Director, unless and until the Board of Directors shall elect a person who is not also serving as Executive Director of the

ARTICLE VI EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER

SECTION 1. Employment. The Executive Director of the Alaska Baptist Convention shall also serve in the capacity of the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Foundation, unless and until the Board of Directors shall elect a person who is not also serving as Executive Director of the Convention.

SECTION 2. Duties. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Foundation, subject to the provisions hereof, and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Trustees, shall actively administer the affairs of the office, supervise the work of other Foundation employees, and generally represent the Foundation in matters pertaining to the Foundation. He shall have the custody of the funds, securities and property of the Corporation, and shall deposit all funds belonging to the Corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors. Said funds may be withdrawn only upon draft or check co-signed by the Executive Director-Treasurer and President. The Executive Director-Treasurer shall cause to be published a report of all receipts

and disbursements and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

ARTICLE VII DISTRIBUTION

All funds so received and administered by the Corporation and distributed as herein provided shall be so administered and distributed, within the meaning of Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 and exempt from taxation under Section 501 (a) of the Internal Revenue Code, for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Alaska Baptist Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for other purposes duly qualified under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 and approved by the directors of the Alaska Baptist Foundation.

ARTICLE VIII INDEMNIFICATION

The corporation shall indemnify any trustee or officer or former director or officer of the corporation, and their respective heirs, administrators, successors, and assigns, against any and all expenses, including amounts paid upon judgments, counsel fees, and amounts paid in settlement (before or after suit is commenced), actually and reasonably incurred by such persons in connection with the defense or settlement of any claim, action, suit or proceeding in which they, or any of them, are made parties, or a party, or which may be asserted against them or any of them, by reason of having been trustees or officers or a trustee or officer of the corporation; provided, however, that such indemnity should not be operative with respect to (a) any matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such trustee, officer, or employee, or (b) any matter settled or compromised, unless, in the opinion of independent counsel selected by or in a manner determined by the trustees, there is not reasonable ground for such person's being adjudged liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties as such trustees or officer.

ARTICLE IX AMENDMENTS

Amendments may be made in these Bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the members present when the vote is taken without regard to total enrollment at any annual meeting of the Convention, provided (1) no amendment may be considered after the second session of the Convention, (2) and that the proposed change be submitted in writing to the Convention office and the Constitution and Bylaws Committee at least one hundred twenty (120) days prior to the Annual Convention and published in state Baptist paper or mailed to the churches thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Convention.
